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
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HOW HAVE WE MET THAT GROWTH? 2

The district first uses portables (350), year-round schedules, and makes boundary adjustments to handle growth.

It currently has five year-round elementary schools in areas of high growth.

- Bluff Ridge in Syracuse — 1,035 students
- Eagle Bay in west Farmington — 917 students
- Endeavour in west Kaysville — 1,142 students
- Heritage in west Layton — 1,074 students
- Sand Springs in west Layton — 1,041 students

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

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

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

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

Based on current projections, 14 portables will be on-site by 2018.

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

Based on current projections, 19 portables will be on-site by 2018.




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

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THE SCHOOL BOARD PROPOSES A BUILDING BOND 12



- New Construction, Renovations, Additions and Property Purchases:

\$ 246 M

- Maintain and Enhance Existing Infrastructure — more than 10 million square feet. (roofs, boilers, power upgrades, water line replacements, parking lots, fire alarm upgrades, etc.)

\$ 52 M

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THE BALLOT LANGUAGE IS CONFUSING

Most of the language that appears on the ballot is required by law and could be misconstrued. It is important to understand the ballot.

... is not expected to have a cumulative increase ... of more than **\$7.49 on a \$240,000 residence.**

(That means a \$1 to \$2 increase per year.)

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THE BALLOT LANGUAGE IS CONFUSING

If the Bonds are issued as planned, (and without regard to the existing taxes currently paid for existing bonds that will reduce over time) a property tax to pay debt service on the Bonds will be required over a period of 26 years in the estimated amount of \$168.84 per year on a \$240,000 residence.

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
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TAX IMPACT OF THE BOND

Without this \$298 million bond, property taxes could decrease gradually over seven years by about \$168.84.



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
