ADMINISTRATIVE REVIEW/REPORTS/FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS – COMMISSION**Letter from Bear River Water Conservancy District – Commissioner Scott**

Commissioner Scott read a letter from Bear River Water Conservancy District concerning a proposed tax increase.

Thank You Letter from Commissioner Milne of Tooele County – Chairman Summers

Chairman Summers read a letter from Tooele County Commissioner Milne regarding the county fair. In the letter he thanked the county commissioners for the visit and commended the county on having a successful fair.

Report of County Fair and Peach Days – Chairman Summers

Commissioner Summers thanked the community for coming together for the fair and Peach Days. He spoke about how generous people were with the livestock auction and commended the citizens and volunteers for their hard work and dedication to make the fair and Peach Days a success.

Recent Board Appointments – Chairman Summers

Chairman Summers acknowledged Commissioner Hadfield has been appointed to the EDCUtah board and Commissioner Scott has been appointed to a steering committee over finance, pensions and intergovernmental affairs through the National Association of Counties.

REDUCE EVENTS CENTER RENTAL FEE/BENEFIT FOR BRIGGS MADSEN – NICOLE PORTER

Hailey Woodward and Nicole Porter explained they are holding a fundraiser at the county fairgrounds for Briggs Madsen. Briggs is a 15-year-old from Honeyville who was injured in a rodeo accident on August 22, 2015. They updated the commissioners on his medical condition and asked if they could have a reduction in the cost to rent the fairground facilities. Ms. Woodward and Ms. Porter are anticipating about 500 people to attend the event which will include team roping and barrel racing.

MOTION: Commissioner Scott made a motion to approve a reduction in the cost of facilities rental for the Briggs Madsen Benefit. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Hadfield and unanimously carried.

MOTION: Commissioner Hadfield made a motion to approve the language of the “FOR” arguments to be included in the voter information pamphlet. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Scott and unanimously carried.

TAX REMOVAL FOR USU – SHAUN THORNLEY

County Treasurer Shaun Thornley explained the tax removal for USU is due to other parcels not being terminated properly, therefore showing back taxes on this parcel. The parcels have been corrected.

MOTION: Commissioner Scott made a motion to remove the back taxes on account #R0088339. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Hadfield and unanimously carried.

BENEFIT CONCERT/PAYMENT TO NUCOR – TOM KOTTER

Auditor Tom Kotter stated the county did not have an official contract with NUCOR regarding the benefit concert. He stated \$23,600 has been received in revenue from the concert and it is his understanding there was an agreement to send all the money to NUCOR. Their cost is \$25,000 which would leave none of the money going towards the honor flight, and costing NUCOR \$1400 to sponsor the event depending on how NUCOR handles their end. The current expenses incurred by the county are approximately \$12,000.

MOTION: Commissioner Hadfield made a motion to send the concert revenue payment to NUCOR. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Scott and unanimously carried.

FIRE CONTRACTS – COREY BARTON/TIFFINE BINGHAM

Fire Marshal Corey Barton explained the fire contracts are with Thatcher/Penrose and Mantua; they are extending their three year contract.

MOTION: Commissioner Scott made a motion to approve contracts #15-25 and #15-26 with Thatcher/Penrose and Mantua Fire Departments. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Hadfield and unanimously carried.

UPDATE ON GRANTS/FUNDS/VOCA AND VAWA – JULIE JACOBSEN/SHIRLENE LARSEN

This item was cancelled.

KEEP IT LOCAL CAMPAIGN – JEUNE ELLE JEFFRIES

Chairman Summers reported a gathering was held before the meeting on the front steps of the courthouse and the commissioners signed a “Give Local Proclamation”. He explained the Give Local campaign is to encourage businesses and individuals to donate their time and money to local organizations as it gives more to our community.

APPOINT HEARING OFFICER – SCOTT LYONS

This item was cancelled.

RESOLUTION #15-07/PLANNING DEPARTMENT FEE SCHEDULE UPDATE – SCOTT LYONS

County Planner Scott Lyons explained the resolution amends the fee schedule for services provided. It amends the ordinance amendment fee and the zoning map amendment fee.

MOTION: Commissioner Hadfield made a motion to approve Resolution #15-07 concerning the planning department fee schedule. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Scott and unanimously carried.

RESOLUTION #15-08/PRE-DISASTER MITIGATION PLAN – MARK MILLETT & SCOTT LYONS

Emergency Manager Mark Millett explained Resolution #15-08 addresses a pre-disaster mitigation plan. He stated the county overall looks good with no gaps. The biggest recommendation would be for earthquake retrofitting of buildings. This resolution voids the 2009 plan.

MOTION: Commissioner Scott made a motion to approve Resolution #15-08 for the 2015 Pre-Disaster Mitigation Plan: Bear River Region. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Hadfield and unanimously carried.

APPROVAL OF LANGUAGE FOR ARGUMENTS TO BE INCLUDED IN THE VOTER INFORMATION PAMPHLET FOR THE TRANSPORTATION TAX – COMMISSION

Clerk Marla Young explained the arguments “FOR” Proposition 1 have been received in a timely manner and the voter information pamphlet is being prepared. She presented the commissioners with the language for the voter information pamphlet. She notified them the “AGAINST” arguments have been also been submitted and any rebuttals are due on September 24, 2015.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

DeAnna Hardy of Brigham City said she went to the school board meeting to oppose their tax increase. She said she opposes public education and does not feel it is right to force others to pay for education. Ms. Hardy said there should not be a public/private partnership with STRATA and there should not be an economic development department. She asked the commission to restore the regular polling locations as she feels voting by mail is not a secret ballot. She commented about the county fair taking away the people's money to provide entertainment. She quoted Thomas Jefferson and warned the commission that Envision Utah is part of Agenda 21.

Dear Commissioners,

The Bear River Water Conservancy District Board of Trustees desires to raise the District's Certified Tax Rate from 0.000192 to 0.0003. This proposed rate will raise the certified tax rate of the District back up to the statutory limit of 0.0002 and includes an additional 0.0001 as allowed by the Utah Code 17B-2a-1006. Utah Code 17B-2a-1006 allows an additional levy to provide adequate funds to pay maturing bonds or other debts of the District. The District has bonded for and completed major water system projects in South Willard, Beaver Dam, Collinston, Harper Ward, and Bothwell and have the capacity to provide fire flow. Fire hydrants have been installed in all systems except Bothwell. These culinary water systems are serving or have the ability to serve fourteen entities by providing a new water system, an additional water supply for their existing system, or serves as an emergency backup source. These water supplies also assist in compliance with the Division of Drinking Water standards.

Water is essential to Box Elder County's economic health and wellbeing. The challenge with constructing culinary water systems is that the infrastructure and facilities to deliver water are expensive and all upfront while the revenue from new growth comes in over time to repay the bonds. The District has three sources of revenue which include water revenue, impact fees and property taxes.

The District Board has always been and will continue to be fiscally responsible in their efforts to develop and serve water for the needs of Box Elder County. In doing so, it is very important that the District raise the certified tax rate to the maximum rate allowable by law to be able to continue to provide excellent service, for operation and maintenance and to plan, develop, and provide water for the future. The additional 0.0001 is needed to pay outstanding bonds and fund the capital facilities funds associated with the bond requirements.

The District appreciates the service the County Commission provides and requests support and approval from the Commission for the District to move forward through the truth and taxation process. Thank you for your consideration and continued support of the Bear River Water Conservancy District.





This resolution shall be effective on the date it is adopted.



CONTRACT FOR FIREFIGHTING/HAZMAT SERVICES

15-25

This AGREEMENT made and entered into by and between BOX ELDER COUNTY, a county of the State of Utah (hereinafter "County") and Thatcher-Penrose, a city or town organized under the laws of the State of Utah (hereinafter "Fire Department").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, County is desirous of obtaining fire fighting services for those areas of unincorporated Box Elder County which are outside the boundaries of Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, County is willing to provide County firefighting equipment to Fire Department for use by Fire Department in responding to fires on behalf of County; and

WHEREAS, Fire Department has the capacity and is willing to provide to County firefighting services within those areas of unincorporated Box Elder County which are outside the boundaries of Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, County and Fire Department are desirous of entering into this Agreement to specify the manner in which Fire Department will provide firefighting services to County outside the boundaries of Fire Department;

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of these recitals and the other good and valuable consideration set forth herein, County and Fire Department do hereby agree as follows:

1. Fire Fighting Services to be Provided by Fire Department to County Outside the Local Boundaries of the Fire Department. In exchange for the payments from County as set forth in this Agreement, Fire Department shall provide fire fighting services to County in unincorporated areas of Box Elder County outside the boundaries of Fire Department as follows:

AZZ #7

- A. Fire Fighting Services. When requested by County, Fire Department shall respond to fire calls in the unincorporated areas of Box Elder County outside of Fire Department boundaries with at least five (5) Fire Department firefighters for structure fires , four (4) Fire Department firefighters for wildland fires, and one (1) County fire truck, together with all necessary equipment, hoses and supplies. Fire Department shall utilize County equipment initially, but may utilize Fire Department equipment if requested by County. Fire Department shall be solely responsible for paying each individual Fire Department firefighter and maintaining any Fire Department equipment utilized in connection with the fire fighting services rendered by Fire Department pursuant to this Agreement.
- B. Hazmat Services. When requested by County, Fire Department shall respond to hazmat calls in the unincorporated areas of Box Elder County outside of the Fire Department boundaries with at least five (5) Fire Department hazmat team members and one (1) County hazmat equipped truck, together with all necessary equipment and supplies. Fire Department shall utilize County equipment initially, but may utilize Fire Department equipment if requested by County. Fire Department shall be solely responsible for paying each individual Fire Department hazmat team member and maintaining any Fire Department equipment utilized in connection with the hazmat services rendered by Fire Department pursuant to this Agreement.
- C. The \$945.00 fee will only be paid to the department contracted for a specific area, any units that are dispatched under an automatic aid agreement will be considered "reciprocal aid" or "mutual aid" Units dispatched at the request of the contracted department will be paid a \$250 call out fee for the first hour and will be eligible for

hourly rates and mileage. Any units that are dispatched as a medical unit will not receive compensation with the exception of Wildland fires with MOU contracts.

2. Payment from County to Fire Department for Fire Fighting and Hazmat Services. In exchange for the firefighting and hazmat services from Fire Department as set forth in this Agreement, County shall pay Fire Department as follows:

- A. The sum of Nine Hundred Forty Five Dollars (\$945.00) per call (\$345.00 for fire fighters + \$600.00 for capital replacement) for the first hour or any part thereof. However, in the event Fire Department fails to provide five (5) firefighters to any structure fire call, four (4) firefighters to any wildland fire call, or five (5) hazmat team members to any hazmat call, this sum of Nine Hundred Forty Five Dollars (\$945.00) shall be forfeited, and for the first hour of the call, County shall pay Fire Department only the hourly amounts for the responding firefighters and/or hazmat team members as set forth below, as well as mileage at the approved federal rate.
- B. In the event Fire Department remains at the scene of a fire for more than one (1) hour, in addition to the Nine Hundred Forty Five Dollars (\$945.00) mentioned above, County shall pay for each firefighter remaining on scene, the sum of:
 - i. Sixteen Dollars (\$16.00) per hour for each firefighter with a current "Engine Boss" certification
 - ii. Fourteen Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$14.50) per hour for each firefighter on a wildland fire with a current "Squad Boss" certification
 - iii. Fourteen Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$14.50) per hour for each firefighter on a structure fire with a current "Firefighter 2" certification

- iv. Fourteen Dollars (\$14.00) per hour for each firefighter on a wildland fire with a current "Wildland Certification Red Card"
- v. Fourteen Dollars (\$14.00) per hour for each firefighter on a structure fire with a current "Firefighter 1 Structure Certification Card"
- vi. Nine Dollars (\$9.00) per hour for each firefighter who is not certified

And County shall pay for all Fire Department firefighting equipment remaining on scene, the sum of:

- i. One Hundred Thirty Six Dollars (\$136.00) per hour for each Fire Department pumper truck
 - ii. Fifty Four Dollars and Twenty One Cents (\$54.21) per hour for each Fire Department brush truck
 - iii. Forty Dollars and Eighty Four Cents (\$40.84) per hour for each Fire Department type 3 water tender
 - iv. Sixty Five Dollars (\$65.00) per hour for each Fire Department type 2 water tender
 - v. Seventy Six Dollars (\$76.00) per hour for each Fire Department type 1 water tender
- C. In the event a non firefighting vehicle owned by Fire Department is used by Fire Department to transport personnel to the scene, County shall pay Fire Department the standard mileage rate as established by the federal government.
- D. In the event Fire Department remains at the scene of a hazmat incident for more than one (1) hour, in addition to the Nine Hundred Forty Five Dollars

(\$945.00) mentioned above, County shall pay for each Fire Department hazmat team member remaining on scene the sum of:

- i. Fourteen Dollars (\$14.00) per hour for each team member
- ii. In the event any team member is required to suit up in a Class A or Class B Hazmat Response Suit, Sixty Dollars (\$60.00) per hour for each team member with Tech Level Experience
- iii. In the event any team member is required to suit up in a Class A or Class B Hazmat Response Suit, Thirty Five Dollars (\$35.00) per hour for each team member with Operations Level Experience

County shall pay for all Fire Department hazmat equipment remaining on scene, the sum of:

- i. One Hundred Thirty Six Dollars (\$136.00) per hour (not to exceed a total of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) in total on any one call) for the Fire Department hazmat truck and trailer.
- E. In the event any Fire Department equipment (fire or hazmat) remains at the scene of a call for more than Twenty Four (24) hours, Fire Department may request a reimbursement from County for fuel and/or miscellaneous supplies relating to such equipment.
- F. In the event Fire Department is called out but provides only Minor Services, the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00). "Minor Services" are defined as false alarms, fire alarms with no incipient fires, smoke scares, Power pole or line down calls, carbon monoxide alarms and similar responses which do not involve actual fire fighting or hazmat services.

Such rotation and replacement shall be in a fair and equitable manner among all of those entities, including Fire Department, which have entered into firefighting service agreements with County.

14. Indemnification and Hold Harmless. County shall indemnify and hold Fire Department harmless of and from any and all liability arising out of any negligent act or negligent failure to act, or other negligent activity of Fire Department in its provision of firefighting services under this Agreement.
15. Renewal and Termination of Agreement. This Agreement shall automatically renew for additional one () year terms, upon the same terms and conditions, unless either County or Fire Department shall provide written notice to the other on or before July 1st of each year of its intent to not renew the Agreement and/or to not renew the Agreement unless certain changes are made to the terms and provisions of the Agreement. This Agreement can be

terminated by either County or Fire Department, without cause and for any reason, upon thirty (30) days notice.

16. Interlocal Agreement Terms. In satisfaction of the requirements of the Interlocal Cooperation Act, and in connection with this Agreement, the parties agree as follows:

No real or personal property shall be acquired jointly by the parties as a result of this Agreement, unless specifically agreed to in writing. To the extent that a Party acquires, holds, or disposes of any real or personal property for use in the joint or cooperative undertaking contemplated by this Agreement, such Party shall do so in the same manner that it deals with other property of such Party; and

F. As provided in Section 11-13-219 of the Interlocal Cooperation Act, the Parties agree that a notice of this Agreement shall be published in the Box Elder News Journal, which is hereby designated by Parties as the official newspaper for all publications made under the Interlocal Cooperation Act. Any person in interest may contest the legality of this Agreement for 30 days after the publication of the notice of this Agreement. After the 30 days have passed, no one may contest the legality of the Agreement or any action performed or instrument issued under the authority of this Agreement for any cause whatsoever.

CONTRACT FOR FIREFIGHTING/HAZMAT SERVICES

15-26

This AGREEMENT made and entered into by and between BOX ELDER COUNTY, a county of the State of Utah (hereinafter "County") and Mantua, a city or town organized under the laws of the State of Utah (hereinafter "Fire Department").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, County is desirous of obtaining fire fighting services for those areas of unincorporated Box Elder County which are outside the boundaries of Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, County is willing to provide County firefighting equipment to Fire Department for use by Fire Department in responding to fires on behalf of County; and

WHEREAS, Fire Department has the capacity and is willing to provide to County firefighting services within those areas of unincorporated Box Elder County which are outside the boundaries of Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, County and Fire Department are desirous of entering into this Agreement to specify the manner in which Fire Department will provide firefighting services to County outside the boundaries of Fire Department;

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of these recitals and the other good and valuable consideration set forth herein, County and Fire Department do hereby agree as follows:

1. Fire Fighting Services to be Provided by Fire Department to County Outside the Local Boundaries of the Fire Department. 
