PUBLIC HEARING

The American Fork City Council met in a public hearing on Tuesday, October 13, 2015, in the American Fork City Hall, 31 North Church Street.

7:20 p.m. - Receiving of public comment regarding the Humble Annexation at 1191 East 700 North consisting of 1.16 acres

Mayor Hadfield stated that no protests had been received. He asked if there were comments from the audience. There were none. The hearing closed at 7:24 p.m.

### REGULAR SESSION

The American Fork City Council met in regular session on Tuesday, October 13, 2015, in the American Fork City Hall, 31 North Church Street, commencing at 7:30 p.m.

1. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE; PRAYER BY COUNCILMAN JEFF SHORTER; ROLL CALL.

Mayor Hadfield led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance and Councilman Shorter offered a prayer.

2. PRESENTATION OF HEROES IN THE COMMUNITY AWARDS BY POLICE CHIEF LANCE CALL AND A PRESENTATION OF A MERITORIUS SERVICE MEDAL BY FIRE CHIEF KRISS GARCIA

Fire Chief Garcia explained this was an amazing event and without the efforts of Cesar Helaman Villela there would have been a tragedy. The initial call came in regarding a kid getting torn apart by a pit bull. As others were trying to get the boy away from the pit bull, Helaman and his dad drove by in their pickup truck they saw what was happening and got out to assist. Helaman understood dogs and he understood pit bulls and he had been around them. He understood that he had to cover the boy's face. At his own risk he put his hands in front of the boy's face while the dog was trying to get at it. He picked the boy up and put him in the back of the truck and drove around the corner and called 911. That was the short version. The long version was the first thing was Nicole saw him and tried to help and said a prayer out loud that, "I cannot do this by myself." She was able to initially pick the dog off of the boy. The dog then recaptured the boy. Helaman was on his way to the freeway, missed an exit, and happened to be at the right place at the right time. As he was driving around the corner that was when Fire Chief Garcia first met Helaman and Colby.

Fire Chief Garcia reported that tonight Colby was doing great. He was the Fire Department's best friend and they were going to invite him to the fire station and they were going to cook lunch for him and his family. He turned time to Helaman for his comments.

Helaman noted that he had made a lot of friends in the past few weeks. It was a neat experience in an unfortunate situation. When this happened he had a baby that was just a week old. That crossed his mind a couple of times when they were face to face with an adult pit bull. He and Colby were both recovering. They had gotten together and had a BBQ just a few days ago and that was really nice.

Fire Chief Garcia presented Helaman with a Meritorious Service Medal from the Fire Department. There was a standing ovation.

Police Chief Lance Call congratulated Helaman and expressed the Police Department's appreciation for what he did. Police Chief Call and Fire Chief Garcia knew a little bit about heroes and heroic acts, but it was exceptional when someone goes out of their way

and puts themselves in harm's way to save another individual. It was certainly a save that day. He presented Helaman with the Police Department's Heroes in the Community Award. There was general applause. Helaman shook hands with the Council.

Mayor Hadfield asked for one more round of applause.

Mayor Hadfield stated that he heard often of kind acts in the community but seldom did it rise to that level.

City Recorder Richard Colborn issued the Oath of Office to Youth City Recorder Jenna Brady.

Youth City Recorder Jenna Brady then issued the Oath of Office to Youth City Council members that were in attendance.

There was general applause.

Mayor Hadfield recognized Randy Lish who was the advisor for this group and expressed appreciation for his efforts.

He thanked the Scouts for their attendance.

Mr. Glade Gordon commented that he was grateful to have been able to meet with Mayor Hadfield earlier today and voiced a few concerns that may be present throughout the community. He had a little bit of concern in how the City bill had been handled and the extremity of some of the items that had been listed on there in comparison to other cities that surround American Fork, one being Lehi. When pressurized water was looked at

American Fork was nearly triple what the bill in Lehi was and that bill had not changed in nearly eight years.

Mr. Gordon noted that property tax was brought up in a newsletter a few months back stating that American Fork's property tax was maybe lower than a lot. That was not true. As he dug a little deeper he found that was not the total truth. There were other concerns that some in the town were not willing to voice.

Another concern to him was that car dealerships were written up in the newsletter saying that because of the greatness of the car dealerships and the amount of money that filtered through there and came down to the City that the City bill should be able to be lowered but nothing had happened. It worried him that those statements were made and they did not happen. It needs to be opened up. Others that may feel the same way needed to voice their opinions so that as a City Councilmember those things could be taken care of with the Mayor's help.

Mr. Gordon continued that he lived alone in a home that was his father's home that had 2900 square feet all on one level with one bathroom, one toilet, no one else living there, and yet the water bill was outrageous. Plumbers had come and he had no leaks. He asked one of the City Councilman if he would work on that for him and he never heard back.

Mr. Gordon expressed that when he came to meet with the Mayor he noticed there were four things written inside the elevator.

1. Integrity
2. Commitment
3. Teamwork
4. Excellence

Under Integrity the first line said, "We align our actions with our words and deliver what we promise." If a City Councilman was too busy and could not deliver on what he promised he needed to pass it on to somebody else. As a concerned citizen and as other people were concerned they needed to openly express their opinions. He saw many comparisons from city to city and American Fork was not the lowest anywhere. American Fork was almost always the highest in cost factor. He did not feel that was fair. He represented six generations in American Fork.

Stacia Rorke, owner of Beyond Glaze Gourmet Donuts, was present representing PopnSweet, Port o Subs, and Trek Cycles to follow up on things that were talked about at the last meeting but they hadn't seen any results. They had talked about

1. Additional funding so the work crews could work 24/7. That was denied.
2. When working in front of the stores work from Saturday night thru Monday morning. That did not happen.
3. Sign about the businesses open. The sign was now in front of the gas station/Subway. It was not directing traffic their way. Also there were more than two or three letters out on that sign.
4. Hadn't heard back on possible compensation for their losses which amounted to about 67

percent.

They were getting the run around from the construction guys, TSSD, and now City Inspectors.

Mayor Hadfield asked Public Works Director Dale Goodman to report on the results of the direction given after the last meeting.

Dale Goodman reported that they looked at the possibility of a longer work schedule each day. It was not going to shorten construction time significantly and would not be worth the extra money.

Mayor Hadfield noted that there was still the cure time on cast-in-place manholes.

Mr. Goodman explained that they did sit down with the contractors and explained the urgency. He did not have an answer about compensation for business lost.

Andy Spencer reported that it was presented to TSSD.

Mayor Hadfield stated that TSSD came back and said that they were putting in the City's line and asked how much were you willing to cough up?

Mr. Goodman noted that the intersection had been paved and by the end of the week they were supposed to be the rest of the way through Grassland and around behind Best Buy.

Mayor Hadfield asked about the directional sign.

Mr. Goodman thought it needed to be moved closer.

Councilman Shelton noted that he was not at the last Council meeting, but his concern was that the City needed to get back with people when a concern was brought to the Council. City staff needed to work on that.

Councilman Bowen expressed that he was shocked. This had been going on for months. When he first saw this construction he thought it would be done in a few days or a week. This area was a major shopping center and it was being treated as if it was in the middle of a field where there was no traffic and no businesses and no people. In the future they had have clauses in the contract and a set time limit and after that they needed to start to reimburse businesses. He was sure that the small businesses could document their lost revenue and tie it to the road closure. This was just unacceptable.

Councilman Frost explained that he was a small business owner as well and he understood how little things could really hurt especially when one was trying to make a payroll. As for himself, he would be willing to sit down and talk about some of the incurred damages. He thought it was something they should review. A small business just did not have the ability to ride-out this kind of thing. Negotiate was not necessarily the word he would use, but just to look at it and then give them an answer back. He was willing to take direction. Timpanogos Sewer had skin in the game. It was saving them a tremendous amount of money to reroute this. Going in a different direction would have

inconvenienced a lot more residents.

Mayor Hadfield asked Councilman Frost to sit down with them.

Councilman Taylor was concerned that TSSD was passing the buck. The City was a customer of TSSD. The City had taken the backend on a lot of things with TSSD when the City needed help on various things. The fault had to rest somewhere. Civil discourse should be able to take place.

Bart Walker, 365 and 361 North Center. He had been on the other side of the isle. He explained that he had just been through a City inspection. There was only one thing smaller than a small business and that was a resident. He did not have to make payroll but he did have to make all the bills. He pulled a permit to do an addition on a historic site in American Fork and they had worked hard and diligent. He thanked those on the staff who had work with them. They were originally from American Fork and chose to come back to this area. In the heat of the moment earlier today he made the comment that he wished he had never would have. He retracted that statement now in front of this public forum in the hope they could resolve issues with people trying to improve property without it being an undue process. He knew there was Code to meet and also knew that there were Ordinances to meet. The Ordinances could be dealt with by the Council in a timely fashion. He needed to be out of 361 and in 365 within two weeks. He did not know if it was going to happen. Years ago he could do some of things but now he did not have the energy. He could only work the end of a shovel and maybe a little painting. They were trying to make the community better.

Next time Mr. Walker would be in his suit and have photographs of the before and after. He asked for help in getting the issues resolved as soon as possible.

Mayor Hadfield asked what issues were unresolved at the present time.

Mr. Walker responded that it was the installation of curb, gutter, and sidewalk on 400 North. He tried to address it earlier with the City but was told that was the way the Ordinance was. He put up the money for that with the impression that the City was going to do the work. He was informed today that the City was not and that he should get it built according to the plans. He did not have a copy of the plans. They were trying to get rid of blight.

Mayor Hadfield understood that Mr. Walker was looking for a Certificate of Occupancy on the dwelling that had been improved.

Mr. Walker said that he knew that something had to be done. He was going to meet with the Director of Public Works tomorrow. He could not continue to go through this. Every day he would come home from work and there would be something else.

Mayor Hadfield asked that he meet with Mr. Goodman tomorrow and then have his wife call him if it did not come to a satisfactory conclusion and he would intervene.

Mr. Walker stated that he still had pride and loved American Fork City and he wanted to see something happen.

5. CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Mayor Hadfield reported that Mr. Whitehead had a knee replacement surgery yesterday morning and was recovering in the hospital. It was expected that he would be out until the next council meeting in two weeks.

6. COUNCIL REPORTS CONCERNING COMMITTEE ASSIGNMENTS

Councilman Bowen appreciated Glade's comments. He was not the Councilman that he had apparently contacted. He would happy to work with any of his fellow Councilmembers in reducing rates. He had tried to lower property taxes and fees.

Councilman Bowen reported that the Beautification Committee was working on the Scarecrow competition and have received several entry forms. Several businesses were participating.

Councilman Taylor had nothing to report at this time.

Councilman Shelton stated that he would be happy to sit down with Glade and go through that City bill. It was important to note that there were things that the City had done to make sure they did not have increases. It was hard to look at a bill and compare it to other cities and not look apples to apples.

Councilman Shelton reported that the Chamber of Commerce held a Meet the Candidates luncheon on October 7. There were a couple more Meet the Candidate events coming up. October 21 and 22 at the American Fork High School, times would be posted on Facebook. There would be another one on October 24.

Councilman Shorter reported that Wasatch Winds would be in concert on October 26 and the American Fork Symphony on November 2. Timpanogos Chorale would be doing a lot of activities in December.

Councilman Taylor amended his no comment. He spoke to Mr. Gordon. In understanding Lehi's Pressurized Irrigation situation, they had the foresight, and American Fork did not, to install that system at a much earlier time when it was much cheaper. It was brought before the American Fork City Council as early as 1998 and consensus from everyone there and input from the public was no; American Fork had an ample water supply. He and Mayor Hadfield were on the Planning Commission at that time and they understood the battle of water that took place at that time. American Fork City ended up bonding through a public vote. It was to be paid back through impact fees and other things. They hit the recession and things changed. The City had done its best to keep it as low as it could. He admitted that even when he was a Councilman the first time 12 years ago it was not even a thought. That was one of Mr. Gordon's comments about triple the cost that made sense.

Councilman Frost was thinking if the Councilman referred to was himself and he was the Councilman that did not follow up. If that was the case it was maybe an oversight on his part. If it was him, he wholeheartedly apologized. He would be happy to revisit that if he was that person.

Councilman Frost reported that a lot was happening at the Cemetery. The road had been reworked. He appreciated the City's Road Department. Work on the Memorial Garden has started. The 120-foot flagpole base was cemented. It was about twelve feet deep and took about eight yards of concrete. He could not wait to see that. The flagpole was being funded by a private donor from Alpine who also may be participating more.

Councilman Frost noted the Cemetery Committee's great tradition of a program on Veterans Day. This year the keynote speaker would be Jake Garn. Six hundred and twenty Fifth Graders have commented to be there at the LDS Tabernacle. Also, special invitation would go out to those that have family members that were deployed.

Councilman Frost reported that there would be a Main Street Vision Open House on October 21 from 6:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. in the Senior Center. It would be a question and answer period. He encouraged all to participate.

Councilman Frost explained than another assignment he had was the Water Management Conservation Board. They were always concerned with what was happening with the watershed. As he was thinking about the watershed he recalled a document that was passed by the City Council by a 4 to 1 margin on June 22, 2015, Environmental Stewardship of American Fork Canyon. He read from portions of the document.

“WHEREAS, there are economic forces that will attempt to utilize public lands or privatize public lands for economic gain to the detriment of lifestyle, we will stand with courage and hold our County and other elected officials accountable for the discharge and protections of these resources which have value that supersedes pure economics.”

“Ensuring that the canyon will continue to be an asset for the public and not overrun by commercial interests that would reduce access for those who enjoy this pristine and remarkable place.”

Councilman Frost noted that one of the Whereas explained that they have “reasonable preservation.” With the Mayor's permission he invited Kurt Williams to show recent work that had been done in the Canyon at Tyng's grave. A short video was presented. The fence around the grave was redone in conjunction with National Public Lands Day which took place the last Saturday of every September. This was just one of many sites that deserved protection in the Canyon.

## 7. MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor Hadfield recognized Councilmembers Shelton and Frost who were incumbents in this election and Kevin Barnes and Allen Simpson who were in the audience. There were two candidates that had filed and then chose not to run.

Mayor Hadfield reported that he attended the recent debate. It was well moderated by Kay Christopherson Representative of District 56. Questions were written and answered individually by the four candidates in a random order. He applauded all four candidates. He thought they were timely, knowledgeable, all did a very good job. He noted there

were some other Meet the Candidates coming up at the High School. There was an open Meet the Candidate opportunity on Saturday morning October 24 at 9:00 a.m. in the American Fork Hospital who will provide pancakes. They call it Pancakes and Politics.

Review and action on subdivisions, commercial projects, condominiums, and PUD’s including 1) plat approval; 2) method of satisfaction of water rights requirements; 3) posting of an improvement bond or setting of a time frame for improvement installation; and 4) authorization to sign the final plat and acceptance of all dedications to the public and to have the plat recorded.
  - a. Review and action on an Ordinance approving a commercial site plan for Mac Plumbing, located at 413 East 620 South, in the GC-2 Planned Commercial zone. *(Requested by Adam Olsen, Planning)*

Mayor Hadfield asked if there were questions on the Mac Plumbing site plan.

Councilman Bowen explained that he noticed that in the engineering reports the concern

of liquefaction was raised. In the response the petitioner would put in additional footings to address the side to side but he did not see any risk mitigation for settling.

Andy Spencer responded that this was in the Sensitive Lands Area. The City sent out those reports for professional consultant review who specialized in Geotechnical Engineering. The professional engineer's final sign off would be required before they would be able to proceed. The City's reviewer was RB&G Engineering. They will verify.

**Councilman Taylor moved to adopt Ordinance No. 2015-10-63 approving a commercial site plan for Mac Plumbing, located at 413 East 620 South, in the GC-2 Planned Commercial zone with instructions to the City Recorder to withhold publication of the ordinance subject to all conditions identified in the public record associated with the September 16, 2015 Planning Commission meeting. Councilman Shorter seconded the motion.**

2. REVIEW AND ACTION ON AN EXTENSION OF THE PERFORMANCE GUARANTEES FOR AUTUMN CREST, PLATS A, B, AND C LOCATED AT APPROXIMATELY 1050 NORTH 1000 EAST. (Requested by Dale Goodman, Public Works)

Mayor Hadfield explained that this development was originally approved a number of years ago. It was brought back and replatted. The City had a Sunset Clause in that construction must begin within a year or the approvals went away. In this case the developer is asking for a one-year extension. Some circumstances in the family has led to this request. Mayor Hadfield was okay with it.

Andy Spencer asked that the request be approved for a period of six months.

Mayor Hadfield calculated that the extension would then be to 13 April 2016.

Mayor Hadfield asked if there were any questions.

Councilman Bowen expressed that he did not think that six months was an adequate length of time based on the time frame provided by Patterson. He felt it should just be the year.

Mr. Spencer explained that the original approval was in 2012. The plats were recorded late in 2014. They asked for an extension of a year and still have not done anything. They were three years from the date of first approval. It's been a long time already.

**Councilman Bowen move to extend the performance guarantee for the Autumn Crest Subdivision, Plats A, B, and C, finding that the proposed construction schedule by the developer is satisfactory and is to be adhered to, finding that there are no hazards or unreasonable inconveniences to the public or adjacent residents,**

**requiring a review of the guarantee to determine if an increase is necessary along with the guarantee issuer's willingness to extend for a period of nine months. Councilman Shorter seconded the motion.**

Councilman Shelton asked that if for some reason they failed to meet the nine month schedule if it would come back to the Council for resolution.

Mr. Spencer answered that would be the standard course of action.

Mayor Hadfield noted that the extension would go to 13 July 2016.

Mayor Hadfield stated that Mr. Olsen had worked with the Planning Commission to update the Parks and Open Space Element of the General Plan. The Planning Commission has recommended adoption.

Mayor Hadfield asked if there were any questions on this item. There were none.

4. REVIEW AND ACTION ON AN AGREEMENT FOR THE CATALYST BUSINESS PARK ANNEXATION CONSISTING OF 110.53 ACRES, LOCATED AT 150 EAST 1500 SOUTH. (Requested by Adam Olsen, Planning)

Mayor Hadfield noted that the petitioner was in attendance. Part of the Annexation would be in the Planned Industrial zone and part in the Shoreline Protection zone. He asked if there were any questions.

Councilman Shelton commented that he had an opportunity to meet with Catalyst and talk a little bit about some options that they were looking at doing. This was a pretty big project that they were looking at on the south end particularly next to the lake. He wondered if it made sense to hold a joint work session with the Planning Commission on this. He would like to see different ideas that might surface in the area.

Mayor Hadfield mentioned that the Utah Lake level of 4495 was the level at which flooding would occur. It was the 100-year Flood Plain. He was happy to meet with the Planning Commission. He grew up in the area and had seen ice stack up 40-feet high when the wind blew. They needed to defend that line.

Councilman Shelton agreed with the Mayor that they should not commit City resources beyond what it could defend.

Mayor Hadfield asked Mr. Adams where he wanted to go with this.

Mr. Adams expressed that he wanted to do this right. He believed they could have some appropriate uses below that line. He would like that opportunity. He was open to compromise and discussion and would appreciate the opportunity.

Councilman Shorter did not mind having buildings down there but he would like to stop at the line the City could defend. He would like to talk more about it.

Mr. Adams felt they could make it safe.

Councilman Frost felt it was worth exploring.

**Councilman Shelton moved to table this item to a joint work session with the Planning Commission and asked that the Mayor and Staff work together to find a time to meet. Councilman Shorter seconded the motion.**

Councilman Bowen asked that with this electronic voting, how was it known that a vote to table was what they were voting on versus what the original vote was going to be on.

The City Recorder responded that minutes were still being taken.

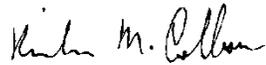
