| Discussion | Mr. Wright reported the revised drawings for this Final Plat were submitted to the City on 10/28/2015. Staff is currently reviewing these plat drawings and should be ready to proceed by the November 17, 2015 Planning Commission meeting and they will then come before the City Council on December 8, 2015. The Planning Commission approved the Preliminary Plat for the Patterson Homestead Subdivision on May 5, 2015. This Final Plat for Phase 1 consists of 27.4 acres for 58 lots that are zoned R-1-15. Mayor Adams stated the public hearing remains open from the previous meeting and asked for public comment, there was none. He stated the public hearing will continue to remain open until the December 8, 2015 City Council meeting. |
| CONCLUSION | Councilmember Patterson moved to table Resolution No. 22-15, a request for approval of the Final Plat for Phase 1 of the Patterson Homestead Subdivision located at 2580 North on the east side of 3000 West to December 8, 2015 with the public hearing to remain open. | Discussion | Mr. Wright reported Mr. Chambers has requested to modify his rezone request before the Planning Commission from AE to R-1-10. The new request will be reviewed with the Planning Commission on November 17 and then come back to the City Council on December 8, 2015. The R-1-10 zone will allow Mr. Chambers to build the size of garage he would like and should satisfy concerns by the Planning Commission related to the AE zone allowing animals. At 7:24 p.m. Mayor Adams opened the public hearing and stated it will remain open until the December 8, 2015 City Council Meeting. |

He identified that the area is designated in the Master Land Use Map of the General Plan as Residential (R-1-8). The property is currently zoned Residential (R-1-8) and the property to the North, East and South are also zoned R-1-8, while the property to the West is zoned R-1-10. The issue will be heard by the Planning Commission at on November 17, 2015. Mayor Adams identified the public hearing will remain open to the December 8, 2015 City Council Meeting. |

| Discussion | Mr. Wright recommended this rezone request be tabled to the December 8, 2015 City Council Meeting because there is an ongoing negotiation with the City regarding property for a required access to the proposed development. Mayor Adams declared the public hearing will remain open. |
| CONCLUSION | Councilmember Patterson moved to table Ordinance 15-08Z a rezone request for property located at 1600 W 600 N to the December 8, 2015 City Council Meeting with the public hearing to remain open. Councilmember Stanton seconded the motion. All voted in favor of the motion. |

| Discussion | Mr. Wright provided the following information in the staff report: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The request is for a rezone from Agricultural (A-1) and a portion of Residential (R-1-9) to PH (Patio Home) Zone. • The request meets the criteria for infill development provided in Section 28-22-3 Infill Site Development Characteristics, specifically subsection 2 with acreage of less than 5 acres and surrounding property developed. • The conceptual design for lots meets minimum average of 6,300 square feet and frontage requirements. • There is adequate infrastructure to accommodate this request in the area for this proposed development. <p>Mayor Adams opened the public hearing and stated it will remain open to the December 8, 2015 City Council Meeting.</p> <p>Mr. Wright explained the Planning Commission indicated some support for this rezone request. According to his understanding of the current Master Land Use Map and General Plan, the Patio Home Zone is not supported in this location. The petitioner would like to potentially seek an amendment to the General Plan if the City Council is willing to consider it.</p> <p>Mr. Cluff cautioned the City Council not to consider an amendment to the General Plan for a specific rezone request to avoid setting a precedent.</p> |
| CONCLUSION | Councilmember K. Peterson moved to table Ordinance 15-12Z (inadvertently noticed as Ord 15-10Z on the November 10, 2015 City Council agenda and back up information) to the Dec. 8, 2015 City Council meeting with the public hearing to remain open. Councilmember Stanton seconded the motion. Councilmember M. Petersen abstained because he does not feel an amendment to the General Plan should be considered at this time. All others voted in favor of the motion. |
| J. AWARD PURCHASE OF TWO F550 DUMP/PLOW TRUCKS AND A 40’ AERIAL LIFT TRUCK | |
| Petitioner | Public Works |
| Discussion | Assistant Public Works Director Dave Williams explained the 2015-16 budget included the purchase of a dump truck, a one ton truck and a boom truck. After consideration and |

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| | <p>research on available equipment and pricing, staff proposes the purchase of 2 small dump trucks with plows and sanders and a boom truck which should accommodate the needs of the Department more adequately.</p> <p><u>Trucks:</u> The pricing for the trucks and plows are off the state contract.</p> <p>The City needs trucks to plow snow in the winter more than a truck for hauling. These trucks would be utilized for other purposes in the off season.</p> <p><u>Aerial Lift Truck:</u> three bids were received for the aerial lift truck; the cost identified includes the inverter.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Altec International Inc: \$87,339.00 (with inverter) • Mountain States Industrial Services: \$89,656.73 (with inverter) • Semi Service Inc.: \$88,635.00 (with inverter) <p>Councilmember Mitchell stated he sent Public Works four used vehicles to consider rather than purchasing new vehicles.</p> <p>Mr. Williams said the Public Works Mechanic looked into these options. The 2012 for \$55,000.00 has a 2 foot shorter boom reach and is a 450 rather than a 550 but may be a good option. It is a 2012; it has low mileage, a two year warranty and is in very good shape aesthetically. The Mechanic will look it over thoroughly; it may need some minor repairs.</p> <p>Mr. Child said the lift is electric rather than hydraulic but it comes with several batteries. After talking with the mechanic, he feels confident the truck is a good option which could last 20 years after a few minor repairs with minimal expense.</p> <p>Mr. Cluff stated that the Purchasing Policy will allow for justification of the purchase of the used equipment with adequate findings being identified.</p> |
| CONCLUSION | <p>Councilmember Mitchell moved to authorize the purchase of the two plow trucks</p> <p>1- 2 2016 F550 Trucks to Ken Garff Ford (State Contract AR1940) for \$64,379.12</p> <p>2- 2 Dump Beds, Snow Plows, Sanders, Lights and installation to Semi Service Inc. (State Contracts MA304,MA508) for \$39,739.48</p> <p>And authorize Public Works to inspect the 2012 used aerial lift truck and purchase it if everything checks out. Councilmember M. Petersen seconded the motion. All voted in favor of the motion.</p> |
| K. <u>ORDINANCE 15-09</u> – AMENDMENT TO TITLE 29 OF THE CLINTON CITY CODE TELECOMMUNICATIONS RIGHTS-OF-WAY | |
| Petitioner | Dennis Cluff |
| Discussion | <p>Mr. Cluff identified that last October when Title 29 Telecommunication Rights of Way was established two references to potentially exempt cable TV were inadvertently left in. The intent was to include all of the “telecommunications” potentials, which is indicated by the other definitions in the Ordinance.</p> <p>This Amendment removes those references to exceptions that could possibly exempt cable TV or at least color the real intent of the Ordinance and cause potential misunderstandings. The City Attorney agrees with these amendments.</p> |
| CONCLUSION | <p>Councilmember Stanton moved to adopt Ordinance 15-09, Amending Title 29, Telecommunication Rights-Of-Way of the Clinton City Code. Councilmember Patterson seconded the motion. Voting by roll call is as follows: Councilmember K. Peterson, aye;</p> |

| L. <u>ORDINANCE 15-10 – AMENDMENT TO TITLE 12 OF THE CLINTON CITY CODE AMENDING CH 5 & ADDING CH 6</u> | |
| Petitioner | Dennis Cluff |
| Discussion | <p>Mr. Cluff explained in 2004 the Legislature changed the tax rate for telephone services to a maximum of 4%, which resulted in a change in the Clinton Ordinance; however, the rate was changed again in 2007 to 3.5%. This rate change was modified in practice, but the Code was not updated to reflect it.</p> <p>Additionally, Chapters 2 & 4 were rescinded because they were old cable TV franchise agreements and were no longer in use. However, there is still a need to have some information and clarification about general information on Cable TV. This new chapter is not a Franchise, but rather some basic information that a potential franchisee would be interested to know. Currently staff is nearing completion of a franchise renewal agreement with Comcast Cable. The intent of this ordinance is to clarify issues from this franchise renewal process.</p> |
| CONCLUSION | Councilmember K. Peterson moved to adopt Ordinance 15-10, amending the tax rate of the Telecommunications Franchise Code to 3.5% and adding Chapter 12-6 on Cable TV Franchising. Councilmember Mitchell seconded the motion. Voting by roll call is as follows: Councilmember Mitchell, aye; Councilmember Patterson, aye; Councilmember K. Peterson, aye; Councilmember Stanton, aye. |
| M. <u>ORDINANCE 15-11 – AMENDMENT TO TITLE 22 OF THE CLINTON CITY CODE RESCINDING CH 22-3, UTILITY REVENUE TAX</u> | |
| Petitioner | Dennis Cluff |
| Discussion | <p>Mr. Cluff identified that this portion of the City Code has not been updated for many years. Chapter 22-3 was originally established in 1985 and 22-3-2 was amended to 6% in 1995. It was meant to deal with natural gas, power and telephone Public Utility Services. However, through State Code changes, the City set up Chapter 22-2 to deal with gas and power in 1997 and Chapter 12-5 in 2004 to deal with telephone services. Therefore, chapter 22-3 is no longer needed and is actually in conflict with the newer City Codes and this chapter needs to be removed from the City Code.</p> |
| CONCLUSION | Councilmember Stanton moved to adopt Ordinance 15-11, rescinding Chapter 22-3, Utility Revenue Tax, of the City Code. Councilmember Mitchell seconded the motion. Voting by roll call is as follows: Councilmember Patterson, aye; Councilmember K. Peterson, aye; Councilmember Stanton, aye; Councilmember M. Peterson, aye; Councilmember Mitchell, aye Councilmember Patterson, aye. |
| N. <u>ORDINANCE 15-05 – AMENDMENT TO TITLE 27, CH 6 OF THE CLINTON CITY CODE CONTROL OF BACKFLOW AND CROSS CONNECTIONS</u> | |

| Discussion | <p>Mr. Child explained that since there have been so many changes to the existing Title 27 Chapter 6 (Water Ordinance), it is less complicated to rescind the existing Chapter 6 and replace it with this new language.</p> <p>The new Chapter 6 provides: definitions; clarifications of water service termination policies; and, legal ramifications for violations of this Chapter. These changes reflect the requirements, amendments and acceptance of the Utah DEQ. After approval and signing, this Ordinance and other documents must be transmitted back to the State before November 20th.</p> |
| CONCLUSION | Councilmember M. Petersen moved to adopt Ordinance 15-05 Amending Chapter 27, Control of Backflow and Cross Connections. Councilmember Mitchell seconded the motion. Voting by roll call is as follows: Councilmember K. Peterson, aye; Councilmember Stanton, aye; Councilmember M. Peterson, aye; Councilmember Mitchell, aye; Councilmember Patterson, aye. |
| Approval of Minutes | Councilmember M. Petersen moved to approve the October 13, 2015 City Council Minutes as written. Councilmember Mitchell seconded the motion. All those present voted in favor of the motion. |

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| Accounts Payable | Councilmember Mitchell moved to pay the bills. Councilmember M. Petersen seconded the motion. All voted in favor of the motion. |
| Planning Commission Report | <p>Mr. Wright reported on the November 3, 2015 Planning Commission meeting as recorded in the minutes.</p> <p>He asked the Council if they would consider reopening the General Plan and Master Land Use Map.</p> <p>Councilmember M. Petersen said he would hesitate to open the Plan for a single request.</p> <p>Mayor Adams said he feels it should be considered based on the need in the community, not based on a specific piece of property.</p> <p>Councilmember Mitchell stated that a patio home can go on any building lot; the issue is density.</p> <p>Councilmember K. Peterson reviewed the Utah Code and the requirements of a Master Plan. She said two things need to be considered: 1 – this is not a decision for the City Council – it is a decision for the Planning Commission; 2- a requirement of the General Plan is that the Moderate Income Housing Plan be reviewed every two years as required by State Law. It is time to discuss density and home values.</p> <p>She said there is value in the City Council and Planning Commission operating as different bodies.</p> <p>The decision to open the General Plan should be based on the whole City and the findings of the Moderate Income Housing Plan review and a recommendation from the Planning Commission.</p> <p>The Council agreed that the Planning Commission should follow the process identified in the State Code.</p> <p>Mr. Cluff said the intent of staff is to determine if staff time and resources should be spent for the Planning Commission to move forward with a consideration for modifying the General Plan.</p> <p>The City Council agreed that due to their perceived interpretation of the State Code guidelines regarding the General Plan, the Planning Commission should determine if it is in the communities’ best interest to open the General Plan for consideration of modification.</p> |
| City Manager | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The City offices will be closed on Wednesday, Nov. 11 for Veteran’s Day • Asked for direction on cancelling the Nov. 24, 2015 City Council meeting <p><i>The Council directed Mr. Cluff to cancel the November 24, 2015 City Council Meeting.</i></p> |
| Mayor | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reported the City is seeking appraisals for property at Powerline Park and West Fairfield Park in anticipation of potential future negotiations regarding these properties. • Reported that Wasatch Integrated Waste Management conducted a survey of cities that require mandatory recycling vs. cities with non-mandatory recycling. The first round of tests indicates there is no difference between the two. |
| Councilmember Patterson | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Community Enhancement coordinators have asked to dissolve the group because there is not enough community participation. • The Parks Board would like to present bids they have been seeking regarding the handicap playground equipment to the City Council in December. |
