4 5:32:02 PM Chairman Ernest Burgess called the meeting to order at 5:32 p.m. and welcomed
5 those in attendance. City Recorder Cheryl Peacock Cottle conducted a Roll Call wherein all
6 Council Members were present, except Council Member Christopherson who was excused.
7

8 Council Member Kristie Overson **MOVED** to convene a Closed Session to discuss pending or
9 reasonably imminent litigation at 5:33 p.m. Council Member Dama Barbour **SECONDED** the
10 motion. Chairman Ernest Burgess called for discussion on the motion. There being none, he
11 called for a roll-call vote. The vote was as follows: Armstrong-yes, Overson-yes,
12 Christopherson-excused, Burgess-yes, and Barbour-yes. **All members of the City Council**
13 **present voted and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.**
14

15 The meeting was closed at 5:33 p.m. to discuss pending or imminent litigation, wherein no other
16 matters were discussed. Minutes for the Closed Session were taken and are now on file as a
17 Protected Record.

21 **1.1 Opening Ceremonies – Pledge/Reverence – *Council Chair Burgess***
22 **(Opening Ceremonies for February 3, 2016 to be arranged by Vice-Chair**
23 **Christopherson)**

25 5:47:57 PM Council Member Dama Barbour directed the Pledge of Allegiance.
26

27 5:49:08 PM Council Chairman Ernest Burgess offered the Reverence.
28

29 **1.2 Mayor's Report**
30

31 5:49:22 PM Mayor Lawrence Johnson paid tribute to Police Officer Douglas Barney, who
32 recently lost his life in the line of duty. It was noted the Officer Barney served in Taylorsville for
33 many years. The Mayor referred to Officer Barney as a true hero and called for a moment of
34 silence in his honor. A moment of silence in Officer Barney's memory took place.
35

36 **1.3 Citizen Comments**
37

38 5:50:55 PM Chairman Ernest Burgess reviewed the Citizen Comment Procedures for the
39 audience. He then called for any citizen comments.
40

1 [5:50:59 PM](#) There were no citizen comments, and Chairman Burgess closed the citizen comment
2 period.

7 **3. REPORTS**

8
9 **3.1 UPD Awards – *Precinct Chief Tracy Wyant***

10
11 Unified Police Department Precinct Chief Tracy Wyant presented the following UPD Awards:

12
13 ***November 2015 Officer of the Month*** – Officer Cody Miskin. Chief Wyant described the pro-
14 active efforts of Officer Miskin while handling calls on the graveyard shift. It was relayed that
15 his searches for career criminals have resulted in the discovery of several crimes in progress.
16 Eight proactive cases initiated by Officer Miskin were cited, resulting in multiple arrests of
17 fugitives for felony offenses and the seizure of narcotics. Officer Miskin was commended for his
18 initiative and tenacity and for being a great asset in protecting the Taylorsville community. It was
19 noted that the nomination of Officer Miskin for this award came from Sergeant Brett Miller.

20
21 ***December 2015 Officer of the Month*** – Officer Kyle Andrew. Chief Wyant reported that
22 Officer Andrew responded to a house fire in December with his department-issued fire
23 extinguisher and the fire was extinguished through his quick actions. It was noted that Officer
24 Andrew's efforts prevented the fire from spreading throughout the residence or to surrounding
25 homes. The Chief relayed that Officer Andrew also followed up on a narcotics dealing tip at a
26 motel which resulted in the arrest of an individual with multiple warrants. Chief Wyant stated
27 that Officer Andrew's professionalism makes Taylorsville a safer community. It was noted that
28 both of the officers recognized are assigned to Patrol and have done very proactive work.

29
30 [5:55:57 PM](#) Chief Wyant presented the **Precinct Chief's Award for December 2015** to a young
31 person with ties to the law enforcement community. Laine Miller was recognized, along with
32 her parents UPD Sgt. Brett Miler and Katie Miller. Chief Wyant relayed that Ms. Miller
33 participated in "Sub for Santa" efforts for needy families. She spent significant time and
34 resources on her own accord to provide Christmas for a single father and two teenage children
35 who were living in a hotel room. It was reported that Ms. Miller gathered significant donations
36 from businesses and individuals for this family. The Chief commended Laine for her
37 selflessness and thoughtfulness during the holiday season and for providing Christmas to a
38 family in need.

40 [5:58:51 PM](#) Council Member Dama Barbour congratulated Laine and her parents on a job well
41 done. She thanked the other officers for all they do and the risks they take.

2 5:59:50 PM Council Member Kristie Overson stated her appreciation for all Taylorsville Officers
3 do to protect citizens.
4

5 6:00:30 PM Chief Wyant cited the sad events of the last week with the loss of Officer Barney.
6 He thanked the City for its support of the Barney Family and the law enforcement community in
7 general.
8

9 **3.2 5400 South and Bangerter Interchange – John Taylor**
10

11 6:01:14 PM City Administrator John Taylor thanked those in attendance for allowing flexibility
12 in tonight's meeting in order to allow attendance at the candlelight vigil being held later this
13 evening in honor of fallen Officer Doug Barney. Mr. Taylor indicated that written reports have
14 been provided to the Council and questions will be addressed. He introduced representatives
15 from UDOT and asked them to entertain any questions.
16

17 6:02:10 PM Beau Hunter, UDOT Public Involvement Representative, introduced UDOT Project
18 Manager John Montoya, Design Lead Brian Atkinson with Horrocks, and Consultant Project
19 Manager Jim Horrocks. Mr. Hunter said his role is to involve the City stakeholders, businesses,
20 and residents in the project study.
21

22 6:02:13 PM Mr. Hunter gave an overview of a potential project to develop a freeway-like
23 interchange at four locations, including 5400 South and Bangerter Highway in Taylorsville. He
24 indicated that the interchanges would be similar to the existing configuration at 7800 South. He
25 explained that the project is in the study phase now and construction should start in spring of
26 2017. He illustrated the study area and said the study will contemplate a thru-turn. He noted that
27 the area is pretty tight. He relayed that more information will be available in six to eight weeks
28 and UDOT representatives would like to come back at that time to receive input from the City.
29

30 6:03:53 PM Mr. Hunter listed issues to be addressed in the project study, as follows:

1 Mr. Hunter described coordination efforts and public outreach. He asked that City officials feel
2 free to email him with questions. He cited a desire to engage residents and businesses in the
3 study. He called for any questions.
4

5 6:04:46 PM Council Member Dama Barbour asked if the Council can expect regular reports on
6 the project. Mr. Hunter acknowledged that City Engineer Kirsten Heins will attend bi-weekly
7 study team meetings and UDOT will report back. Council Member Barbour noted that
8 Taylorsville has been greatly impacted by previous UDOT projects and said that should be kept
9 in mind. She questioned whether there will be land acquisitions. Mr. Hunter affirmed that land
10 will be acquired at all four locations, but it is too early to say where. He indicated that effort is
11 being made to evaluate the best plan with the smallest impact. He reiterated that more
12 information will be known in six to eight weeks.
13

14 6:07:00 PM Council Member Barbour inquired whether impacted residents have been contacted
15 yet. It was indicated that all those with potential impact have received a mailer of information
16 and West Lake Veterinary Clinic and Arctic Circle have received personal contact. Mr. Hunter
17 stated that UDOT will work closely with the City to contact everyone and make them aware once
18 more is known.
19

20 6:07:53 PM Mr. Taylor explained that the mailer the Council received last week is the same as
21 that mailed to residents. Mr. Hunter confirmed that the thru-turn will be studied, but the
22 outcome is unknown. He stated that traffic will be evaluated.
23

24 6:08:41 PM Council Member Dan Armstrong questioned how this project might overlap with
25 work being done on I-215 and whether both areas will be tied up at the same time. Mr. Taylor
26 said there may be a small window of overlap, but I-215 work will be started on the north end.
27

28 6:09:45 PM Mr. Hunter agreed to find out more about the time frame for both projects. Mr.
29 Taylor observed that traffic flow will have to be managed day-to-day.
30

31 6:10:37 PM Council Member Overson asked whether all four intersections will be worked on
32 simultaneously. Mr. Hunter said there will be some overlap, but more definite information will
33 be known later this year. He confirmed that funding is in place (\$207 million) for all four
34 allocations. Council Member Overson asked whether Taylorsville's interchange can go first.
35

36 6:12:27 PM Discussion was held regarding elements of implementing a design-build project. It
37 was noted that timing is a difficult issue, as constraints are built in. It was acknowledged that
38 UDOT does not have all the answers tonight, but will be back later in the year to report. Mr.
39 Taylor suggested that the Council should advise of any concerns now.
40

1 [6:14:26 PM](#) Council Member Dan Armstrong cited the UDOT Project on 5400 South, west of
2 Bangerter and the affect it has had on area businesses. Mr. Montoya acknowledged that UDOT
3 is sensitive to the emotional strain projects place on those impacted. He said there are lots of
4 policies and mechanisms in place to assist businesses and residents.
5

6 [6:16:28 PM](#) Council Member Armstrong commented on negative issues and the impact of the
7 project. He said considerations must be given. Mr. Hunter encouraged any concerned parties to
8 contact UDOT. He referenced cards containing contact information that have been left for
9 interested parties.
10

20 5. PLANNING MATTERS

21 5.1 **Public Hearing – To Receive Public Comment Regarding Text Amendment** 22 **to Sections 2.20.060; 3.16.010; 13.020.200; 13.03.010; 13.03.020; 13.03.040;** 23 **13.04.110; 13.11.070; 13.15.050; 13.34.010; 13.36.150 and 18.08.060 of the** 24 **Taylorsville City Code Related to the Board of Adjustment/Hearing Officer** 25 26 27

28 [6:19:10 PM](#) Community Development Director Mark McGrath described the proposed text
29 amendment to City code that would change the existing Board of Adjustment (BOA) to an
30 appointed Hearing Officer. He explained that the BOA is set up to hear variance requests from
31 the strict regulations of the City Development Code. He noted that when the State of Utah
32 passed enabling legislation that allowed cities to have land use regulation, stipulation was also
33 given that a BOA must be organized to hear appeal requests. He noted that this was done back in
34 1996. Mr. McGrath explained that several years ago the legislation was updated in regard to
35 Boards of Adjustments. He cited problems that Boards of Adjustments created for a lot of cities
36 over the years. He explained that State Code now allows for either a BOA or an appointed
37 Hearing Officer to take its place. He relayed that this gives the City discretion to replace the
38 BOA with a professional attorney to make legal land-use decisions.
39

40 [6:21:22 PM](#) Mr. McGrath reported that a number of cities have determined to replace Boards of
41 Adjustment with Hearing Officers and the Taylorsville Planning Commission and staff have

1 decided that this is a wise direction for Taylorsville to go, as well. He observed that it is difficult
2 to keep the BOA fully staffed and trained. He noted that the City's last variance request was in
3 2010. He stated that the Planning Commission gave unanimous recommendation that the City
4 Council make the change to disband the BOA and replace it with an appointed Hearing Officer,
5 who in all likelihood will be the current Administrative Law Judge.

6
7 6:23:22 PM Council Member Dama Barbour asked about current BOA members and their
8 backgrounds. Mr. McGrath indicated that one member is a professional attorney, but he does not
9 know the background of other members without research.

10
11 6:24:21 PM Council Member Dan Armstrong inquired about the expense of hiring a hearing
12 officer. Mr. McGrath relayed that BOA members are paid \$40 per hour. Finance Director Scott
13 Hearing reported that the Hearing Officer is paid about \$125 per hour.

14
15 City Attorney Tracy Cowdell estimated that each case would require about two hours in time,
16 with an approximate cost of \$200 to \$250 per case. He confirmed that the Hearing Officer
17 would only be paid by the case and would not be paid unless there is a matter to consider. He
18 briefly described the process for each case and reiterated that the appointed Hearing Officer
19 would likely be the existing Administrative Law Judge used by the City.

20
21 6:27:12 PM Council Member Dama Barbour agreed that members of the BOA should be
22 qualified, but said she is concerned about moving from a five-member board to one individual
23 officer.

24
25 6:28:11 PM Chair Burgess opened the public hearing on this matter and called for citizen
26 comments.

27
28 6:28:20 PM There were no citizen comments and Chair Burgess declared the public hearing
29 closed.

30
31 **5.1.1 Ordinance No. 16-01 – Text Amendment to Sections 2.20.060;

37 Council Member Kristie Overson asked whether having a Hearing Officer would require any
38 additional staff time. Mr. McGrath stated that less staff time would be involved because training
39 of BOA members would no longer be needed. He confirmed that hearings are not a frequent
40 occurrence at all. He acknowledged that fees are articulated in the code. Council Member
41 Kristie Overson said that, as hearings are so infrequent, there is no hurry to decide and she is in

1 favor of tabling this matter. She noted that Council Member Christopherson may want to weigh
2 in on this proposed amendment when he is present.

3
4 6:30:37 PM Council Member Kristie Overson **MOVED** to table Ordinance No. 16-01 - Text

13 **5.2 Public Hearing – To Receive Public Comment Regarding a Zoning Map**
14 **Amendment for Property Located at 4721 South 3600 West from Limited**
15 **Commercial (LC) to R-1-6**

17 6:31:15 PM Community Development Director Mark McGrath described a request from Jim
18 Wilkinson to rezone a property at 4721 South 3600 West from LC to R-1-6. He illustrated the
19 subject property, explaining that this was historically an L-Shaped lot, but the house has been
20 vacant for a number of years and is in a partial state of disrepair. He relayed that the boarded up
21 home has had problems with break-ins and transients staying there. He observed that this is a
22 good proposal to facilitate two homes and refurbish the existing home. Mr. McGrath showed the
23 existing zoning map and general plan map. He referenced the plan for a proposed subdivision
24 development. He stated that both the Planning Commission and staff recommend approval of
25 the rezoning request.

26
27 6:35:27 PM Council Member Armstrong inquired about the size of the property and Mr.
28 McGrath confirmed that it is 2/3 of an acre and would be three small homes with garages. He
29 confirmed that the City will take care of maintenance along 3600 West and the private property
30 will be handled by the owner. Council Member Armstrong asked whether a Homeowners
31 Association will be implemented.

32
33 6:36:18 PM Mr. McGrath noted that the development will have to be built to City standards. He
34 observed that this is a unique and difficult piece of property. He confirmed that there will be
35 individual lots on the property.

36
37 6:37:14 PM Applicant Jim Wilkinson stated that he owns the adjoining property/business and
38 owns right-of-way to the road. He confirmed that he will be plowing the streets.

39
40 6:38:10 PM Chair Burgess opened the public hearing on this matter and called for citizen
41 comments.

1 6:38:20 PM There were no citizen comments and Chair Burgess declared the public hearing
2 closed.

8 6:38:29 PM Council Member Kristie Overson said she attended the Planning Commission
9 discussion on this matter and feels the amendment is appropriate. She **MOVED** to adopt
10 Ordinance No. 16-02 – To Amend the City of Taylorsville Zoning Map from Limited
11 Commercial (LC) to R-1-6 for Property Located at 4721 South 3600 West. Council Member
12 Dan Armstrong **SECONDED** the motion. Chairman Ernest Burgess called for discussion on the
13 motion. There being none, he called for a roll-call vote. The vote was as follows: Burgess-yes,
14 Armstrong-yes, Overson-yes, Christopherson-excused, and Barbour-yes. **All City Council
15 members present voted in favor and the motion passed unanimously.**

17 **5.3 Public Hearing – To Receive Public Comment Regarding a Proposed
18 Amendment to Chapter 13.26 Signage and Outdoor Advertising of the
19 Taylorsville Land Development Code**

22 ordinance is to accommodate one final tweak to the sign code that was missed the first time
23 through in regard to the standard for freeway oriented signs. He described the specific proposal,
24 with an allowed maximum size of 950 square feet. He explained that a stipulation has also been
25 included that no part of the sign may exceed 30 feet in width. He confirmed that electronic
26 message centers on signs cannot be more than 40% of the total sign copy area of the sign or 350
27 square feet, whichever is less. Mr. McGrath indicated that approval of this code amendment has
28 been recommended by both staff and the Planning Commission.

29
30 6:41:53 PM Chair Burgess opened the public hearing on this matter and called for citizen

20 [6:44:34 PM](#) Emergency Response Coordinator Ben Gustafson presented the subject resolution to
21 adopt the Salt Lake Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. He explained that this plan has
22 been a combined effort to make sure all jurisdictions are on the same page in regard to
23 emergency mitigation. He noted that the plan covers the next five years and then will be revised.
24 He confirmed that it requires no additional funds, but will simply guide the City in hazard
25 mitigation.

26
27 [6:45:59 PM](#) Council Member Dan Armstrong described time he spent stranded in St. Louis
28 during the holidays due to weather and freeway closures. He said he was amazed at how
29 unprepared the area was for an emergency situation. He observed that it is important to plan for
30 the worst and hope for the best.

33 cited the tremendous amount of time and effort that went into the document. Mr. Gustafson
