

Mayor Bunker conducted roll call. Council Member Chase gave the opening remarks then the Mayor led those in attendance in the Pledge of Allegiance.

MINUTES

The minutes of the City Council meeting held February 18, 2016 were presented for approval. Council Member Banks MOVED to adopt the minutes of the Regular City Council meeting held February 18, 2016. The motion was SECONDED by Council Member Western. Mayor Bunker asked if there were any questions or comments regarding the motion. There being none, he

44 called for a vote. The motion passed with Council Member Banks, Council Member Chase,
45 Council Member Keel, and Council Member Western in favor, and Council Member Niles not
46 present.

48 The minutes of the Public Hearing held February 18, 2016 were presented for approval. Council
49 Member Banks noted that Todd Holt's name had been misspelled on line 19. Council Member
50 Banks MOVED to adopt the minutes of the Public Hearing held February 18, 2016 with the
51 spelling correction. The motion was SECONDED by Council Member Keel. Mayor Bunker asked if
52 there were any questions or comments regarding the motion. There being none, he called for a
53 vote. The motion passed with Council Member Banks, Council Member Chase, Council Member
54 Keel, and Council Member Western in favor, and Council Member Niles not present.

56 **ACCOUNTS PAYABLE**
57 The Council reviewed the accounts payables for the period ending March 3, 2016 in the amount
58 of \$150,309.47. There were some transactions discussed by the Council. Council Member
59 Western MOVED to approve the accounts payables for March 3, 2016 in the amount of
60 \$150,309.47. The motion was SECONDED by Council Member Chase. Mayor Bunker asked if
61 there were any questions or comments regarding the motion. There being none, he called for a
62 vote. The motion passed with Council Member Banks, Council Member Chase, Council Member

68 **BUSINESS**
69 Ratification of Municipal Shooting Range Improvement Materials Purchased
70 Council Member Western MOVED to approve the ratification the purchase of materials for the
71 Municipal Shooting Range Improvements in the amount of \$1901.91. The motion was
72 SECONDED by Council Member Banks. Mayor Bunker asked if there were any questions or
73 comments regarding the motion. There being none, he called for a vote. The motion passed
74 with Council Member Banks, Council Member Chase, Council Member Keel, and Council
75 Member Western in favor, and Council Member Niles not present.

77 Public Works Update
78 Assistant Public Works Director Stanworth informed the Council of what projects had been
79 underway since the last meeting including working at the airport installing siding and putting on
80 a padlock on the door, spraying weeds, and putting up tents and banners for the Snow Goose
81 Festival. Asst. Public Works Director Stanworth stated that Public Works Director Kirkland, and
82 Public Works Employees Morris and Ashby were at Rural Water Conference. Asst. Public Works
83 Director Stanworth noted that he and Public Works Director Kirkland had inspected a Vactor
84 and Delta was the shortest of three bids by \$500.00. Asst. Public Works Director Stanworth
85 stated that he had received some concerns about yield signs that had been installed out in

86 White Sage and that some residents had been confused by it. It was suggested that a four-way
87 stop would probably be the safest solution. The Council had no objections to changing the yield
88 signs to stop signs. Asst. Public Works Director Stanworth stated that he had been in contact
89 with Utah Department of Environmental Quality to get clarification about what is permissible
90 for a green landfill. Green waste can be piled and burned with ash removal, but it cannot be
91 buried without a permit. There was a discussion about how to have the dump open and
92 monitored so that impermissible items are not dumped.

93
94 There was a discussion about whether or not to go into closed session for the following
95 presentations and it was decided by the Council to stay in open session.

35 East to the current North Eastern Delta City border ranging, approximately, from the Delta
36 Cemetery, &50 North to 1000 East, but excluding a portion thereof.

37 Rob Droubay noted that the petition he had made requested that the land be zoned a rural
38 residential zone, and he was wanting it to be zoned a rural residential non-manufactured home
39 zone. Rob Droubay explained that he had spoken to the residents not wanting their property
40 included in the annexation and that they had no objections to having City land around them as
41 long as they remained part of the county. Council Member Western asked if the City had any

42 objections to the proposed annexation. Assistant Public Works Director said that there currently
43 wasn't one. There was a discussion about the water and whether there would be an issue. Rob
44 Droubay stated that it was an issue that was currently be addressed, but it would be an issue to
45 be dealt with during the subdivision phase.

41-6a-101

(23) "Highway authority" has the same meaning as defined in Section 72-1-102.

72-1-101:

(8) "Highway authority" means the department or the legislative, executive, or governing body of a county or municipality.

41-6a-906

(1) A highway authority, with reference to highways under its jurisdiction, may erect and maintain stop signs, yield signs, or other traffic-control devices to designate:

(a) through highways; or

(b) intersections or other roadway junctions at which vehicular traffic on one or more of the roadways should yield or stop and yield before entering the intersection or junction.

(2) A violation of Subsection (1) is an infraction.

10-8-30. Traffic regulations.

They may regulate the movement of traffic on the streets, sidewalks and public places, including the movement of pedestrians as well as of vehicles, and the cars and engines of railroads, street railroads and tramways, and may prevent racing and immoderate driving or riding.

Guidance:

The Expressway and Freeway sizes should be used for higher-speed applications to provide larger signs for increased visibility and recognition.

Option:

The Minimum size may be used on low-speed roadways where reduced legend size would be adequate for the regulation or where physical conditions preclude the use of the other sizes.

The Oversized size may be used for those special applications that require increased emphasis, improved recognition, or increased legibility.

Section 2B.04 STOP Sign (R1-1)**Standard:**

When a sign is used to indicate that traffic is always required to stop, a STOP (R1-1) sign shall be used.

The STOP sign shall be an octagon with a white legend and border on a red background. Secondary legends shall not be used on STOP sign faces. If appropriate, a supplemental plaque (R1-3 or R1-4) shall be used to display a secondary legend. Such plaques shall have a white legend and border on a red background. If the number of approach legs controlled by STOP signs at an intersection is three or more, the numeral on the supplemental plaque, if used, shall correspond to the actual number of legs controlled by STOP signs.

At intersections where all approaches are controlled by STOP signs (see Section 2B.07), a supplemental plaque (R1-3 or R1-4) shall be mounted below each STOP sign.

Option:

The ALL WAY (R1-4) supplemental plaque may be used instead of the 4-WAY (R1-3) supplemental plaque.

Support:

The design and application of Stop Beacons are described in Section 4K.05.

Section 2B.05 STOP Sign Applications**Guidance:**

STOP signs should not be used unless engineering judgment indicates that one or more of the following conditions exist:

- A. Intersection of a less important road with a main road where application of the normal right-of-way rule would not be expected to provide reasonably safe operation;
- B. Street entering a through highway or street;
- C. Unsignalized intersection in a signalized area; and/or
- D. High speeds, restricted view, or crash records indicate that a need for control by the STOP sign.

Standard:

Because the potential for conflicting commands could create driver confusion, STOP signs shall not be installed at intersections where traffic control signals are installed and operating.

Portable or part-time STOP signs shall not be used except for emergency and temporary traffic control zone purposes.

Guidance:

STOP signs should not be used for speed control.

STOP signs should be installed in a manner that minimizes the numbers of vehicles having to stop. At intersections where a full stop is not necessary at all times, consideration should be given to using less restrictive measures such as YIELD signs (see Section 2B.08).

Once the decision has been made to install two-way stop control, the decision regarding the appropriate street to stop should be based on engineering judgment. In most cases, the street carrying the lowest volume of traffic should be stopped.

A STOP sign should not be installed on the major street unless justified by a traffic engineering study.

Support:

The following are considerations that might influence the decision regarding the appropriate street upon which to install a STOP sign where two streets with relatively equal volumes and/or characteristics intersect:

- A. Stopping the direction that conflicts the most with established pedestrian crossing activity or school walking routes;
- B. Stopping the direction that has obscured vision, dips, or bumps that already require drivers to use lower operating speeds;
- C. Stopping the direction that has the longest distance of uninterrupted flow approaching the intersection; and
- D. Stopping the direction that has the best sight distance to conflicting traffic.

The use of the STOP sign at highway-railroad grade crossings is described in Section 8B.07.

Section 2B.06 STOP Sign Placement**Standard:**

The STOP sign shall be installed on the correct side of the traffic lane to which it applies. When the STOP sign is installed at this required location and the sign visibility is restricted, a Stop Ahead sign (see Section 2C.26) shall be installed in advance of the STOP sign.

The STOP sign shall be located as close as practical to the intersection it regulates, while optimizing its visibility to the road user it is intended to regulate.

STOP signs and YIELD signs shall not be mounted on the same post.

Guidance:

Stop lines, when used to supplement a STOP sign, should be located at the point where the road user should stop (see Section 3B.16).

If only one STOP sign is installed on an approach, the STOP sign should not be placed on the far side of the intersection.

Where two roads intersect at an acute angle, the STOP sign should be positioned at an angle or else shielded so that the legend is out of view of traffic to which it does not apply.

approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day, and

2. The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour, but
 3. If the 85th-percentile approach speed of the major-street traffic exceeds 65 km/h (40 mph), the minimum vehicular volume warrants are 70 percent of the above values.
- D. Where no single criterion is satisfied, but where Criteria B, C.1, and C.2 are all satisfied to 80 percent of the minimum values. Criterion C.3 is excluded from this condition.

Option:

Other criteria that may be considered in an engineering study include:

- A. The need to control left-turn conflicts;
- B. The need to control vehicle/pedestrian conflicts near locations that generate high pedestrian volumes;
- C. Locations where a road user, after stopping, cannot see conflicting traffic and is not able to safely negotiate the intersection unless conflicting cross traffic is also required to stop; and
- D. An intersection of two residential neighborhood collector (through) streets of similar design and operating characteristics where multiway stop control would improve traffic operational characteristics of the intersection.

Section 2B.08 YIELD Sign (R1-2)

Standard:

The YIELD (R1-2) sign shall be a downward-pointing equilateral triangle with a wide red border and the legend YIELD in red on a white background.

Support:

The YIELD sign assigns right-of-way to traffic on certain approaches to an intersection. Vehicles controlled by a YIELD sign need to slow down or stop when necessary to avoid interfering with conflicting traffic.

Where there is a marked crosswalk at the intersection, the STOP sign should be installed in advance of the crosswalk line nearest to the approaching traffic.

Option:

At wide-throat intersections or where two or more approach lanes of traffic exist on the signed approach, observance of the stop control may be improved by the installation of an additional STOP sign on the left side of the road and/or the use of a stop line. At channelized intersections, the additional STOP sign may be effectively placed on a channelizing island.

Support:

Figure 2A-2 shows some typical placements of STOP signs.

Section 2B.07 Multiway Stop Applications

Support:

Multiway stop control can be useful as a safety measure at intersections if certain traffic conditions exist. Safety concerns associated with multiway stops include pedestrians, bicyclists, and all road users expecting other road users to stop. Multiway stop control is used where the volume of traffic on the intersecting roads is approximately equal.

The restrictions on the use of STOP signs described in Section 2B.05 also apply to multiway stop applications.

Guidance:

The decision to install multiway stop control should be based on an engineering study.

The following criteria should be considered in the engineering study for a multiway STOP sign installation:

- A. Where traffic control signals are justified, the multiway stop is an interim measure that can be installed quickly to control traffic while arrangements are being made for the installation of the traffic control signal.
- B. A crash problem, as indicated by 5 or more reported crashes in a 12-month period that are susceptible to correction by a multiway stop installation. Such crashes include right- and left-turn collisions as well as right-angle collisions.
- C. Minimum volumes:
 1. The vehicular volume entering the intersection from the major street



ORDINANCE

NUMBER 16-267

AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING REAL PROPERTY NORTH OF EXISTING DELTA CITY LIMITS OWNED BY NOTCH PEAK VIEW, LLC AND CONSISTING OF APPROXIMATELY 73 ACRES.

The City Council of the City of Delta, Utah (referred to herein as the "City Council"), recites the following as the basis for enacting this Ordinance:

- A. The owner of property north of existing Delta City limits caused a petition for annexation (the "Petition") to be filed with the City, together with an accurate and recordable map, prepared by a licensed surveyor, of the area proposed for annexation;
- B. The Council adopted the Petition for further consideration;
- C. The proposed annexation will leave or create an unincorporated island or peninsula;
- D. On January 7, 2016; the City Council considered and discussed the question of whether, pursuant to Utah Code Ann § 10-2-402(1)(b)(iii)(B), Delta City would agree and approve annexation of an unincorporated area that will leave or create an unincorporated island, and determined that, as presented in the Petition, that it would;
- E. pursuant to Utah Code Ann § 10-2-402(1)(b)(iii)(B), on or about January 5, 2016, the Board of Millard County Commissioners agreed and approved the annexation of an unincorporated area that will leave or create an unincorporated island as presented in the Petition;
- F. On or about January 25, 2016, the City Council received notice of certification (the "Certification") from the City Recorder certifying that the Petition meets the requirements of state law;
- G. The City Council caused Notice of Certification of Annexation Petition to be published in the Millard County Chronicle-Progress, a newspaper of general circulation, on February 3, February 10 and February 17, 2016; to be timely posted

on the Utah Public Notice Website as required by Utah Code Ann. § 10-2-406 and other applicable law;

- H. No timely protests were filed in accordance with Utah Code Ann. § 10-2-407;
- I. Pursuant to Utah Code Ann. § 10-2-407, the City Council caused a notice of a public hearing in the Millard County Chronicle Progress, a newspaper of general circulation, on February 3, 2016, and to be timely posted on the Utah Public Notice Website;
- J. Pursuant to Utah Code Ann. § 10-2-407, the City Council held the required public hearing regarding the proposed annexation;
- K. After receiving public comment and careful consideration, the Council has determined that it is in the best interest for the health, safety and welfare of the City and its residents to annex the Property and to grant the Petition.
- L. The City Council has determined it to be in the best interest of the residents of Delta City to better define what type of animals are allowed to be kept within City limits, the circumstance by which animals should be housed and maintained, and remedies that should be applied for violations of Delta City animal regulations; and
- M. The City Council finds this ordinance to be in the best interest of the public health, safety and welfare of Delta City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Delta, Utah:

Section 1. Annexation of the Property. Pursuant to Utah Code Ann. § 10-2-407(3)(b) and § 10-2-408, the real property described on the map ("Exhibit A") is hereby annexed to Delta City and the corporate limits of the City are hereby extended accordingly.

Section 2. Notices and Filing. The City shall provide all required noticed and make all required filings concerning this annexation, including, without limitation, those required by Utah Code Ann. § 10-2-425.

Section 3. Zoning. All of the area being annexed shall be and is hereby classified and zoned as RR-NM (Rural Residential Non-Modular).

Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective upon

publication.

Section 5. Action of Officers. All actions of the officers, agents and employees of the City are in conformity with the purpose and intent of this Ordinance, whether taken before or after the adoption hereof, are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

Section 6. Publication. This ordinance, or a summary thereof, is ordered published in the Millard County Chronicle-Progress, a newspaper having general circulation within the city of Delta, Utah.

Section 7. Severability. In the event that any provision of this ordinance less than the entire ordinance is held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, this ordinance shall be deemed severable and such finding of invalidity shall not affect the remaining portions of this ordinance.

Section 8. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances. To the extent that any ordinances, resolutions or policies of the City of Delta conflict with the provisions of this ordinance, it is hereby amended to be in accordance with the provisions hereof.

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

