#### ORDINANCE 2018-.

# AN ORDINANCE AMENDING PROVO CITY CODE REGARDING MUNICIPAL COUNCIL COMMITTEES. (18-078)

WHEREAS, the Rules Committee of the Municipal Council has proposed two amendments to Provo City Code in order to clarify and define the process for establishing and operating committees of the Municipal Council; and

WHEREAS, the first amendment is an addition to Provo City Code Section 1.02.030 (Definitions) in order to define "Councilor" and "Council member"; and

WHEREAS, the second amendment is an addition to Provo City Code Section 2.50.110 (Municipal Council Committees) that would clarify how Municipal Council committees are created and organized;

WHEREAS, on August 7, 2018 and August 21, 2018, the Municipal Council met to ascertain the facts regarding this matter and receive public comment, which facts and comments are found in the public record of the Council's consideration; and

WHEREAS, after considering the facts and comments presented to the Municipal Council, the Council finds: (i) Provo City Code should be amended as described herein; and (ii) such amendments are in the best interests of the residents of Provo City and reasonably further the health, safety, and general welfare of the citizens of Provo City.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Municipal Council of Provo City, Utah, as follows:

#### PART I:

Sections 1.02.030 (Definitions) and 2.50.110 (Municipal Council Committees) of the Provo City Code are amended to read as shown in Exhibit A.

#### PART II:

- A. If a provision of this ordinance conflicts with a provision of a previously adopted ordinance, this ordinance shall prevail.
- B. This ordinance and its various sections, clauses and paragraphs are hereby declared to be severable. If any part, sentence, clause or phrase is adjudged to be unconstitutional or invalid, the remainder of the ordinance shall not be affected thereby.
- C. The Municipal Council hereby directs that the official copy of the Provo City Code be updated to reflect the provisions enacted by this ordinance.

D. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after it has been posted or published in accordance with Utah Code 10-3-711, presented to the Mayor in accordance with Utah Code 10-3b-204, and recorded in accordance with Utah Code 10-3-713.

## END OF ORDINANCE.



#### **1.02.030. Definitions.**

As used in the Provo City Code and amendments thereto, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated, according to the context in which they are used.

"Bribe" signifies any money, goods, right in action, property, thing of value, or advantage, present or prospective, or any promise or undertaking to give any, asked, given, or accepted, with a corrupt intent to influence unlawfully the person to whom it is given in any action, vote, or opinion by such person in any public or official capacity.

"City" means Provo City, Utah.

"Councilor" or "Council member" means a duly elected member of the Provo City Municipal Council.

"Corruptly" imports a wrongful design to acquire or cause some pecuniary or other advantage to the person guilty of the act, established either by proof or by presumption of law.

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#### 2.50.110. Municipal Council Committees.

- (1) Pursuant to Utah Code Section 10-3b-203, the Municipal Council may appoint a committee of council members or citizens to conduct an investigation into any matter relating to the welfare of the municipality.
- (2) For each committee, the Council shall:
  - (a) designate the name and mission statement;
  - (b) designate whether the committee is standing or ad hoc;
  - (c) appoint all voting members or designate the method of their appointment, subject to the following:

(i) no more than three Councilors shall be appointed, unless the Council expressly directs otherwise with respect to a given committee, in which case meetings of the Committee shall be noticed and recorded in accordance with the Open and Public Meetings Act; and

(ii) no citizens shall be appointed as voting members unless the Council makes a finding that the purpose of the committee is to conduct an investigation in accordance with Utah Code Section 10-3b-203(1)(b)(iv), as amended;

(d) appoint a Chair and a Vice-Chair; and

- (e) have the authority to remove any voting member from the committee by majority vote.
- (3) Council staff, and Administrative staff if permitted by the Mayor, may provide support, but are not voting members of any such body. A committee may ask private citizens to assist and provide counsel as needed as non-voting advisors.
- (4) The Chair, Vice-Chair, or a person designated by the Chair or by the committee shall report findings to the Council, assisted as needed by others.

# PROPOSED TERMS OF AN INTERLOCAL COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT FOR THE SALE OF TIMP KIWANIS BOUNOUS PARK TO THE PROVO SCHOOL DISTRICT

**Sale Price:** Yellow Book Appraisal as required by Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) requirements

#### Uses of the Property:

- School District could use the property for student athletic purposes as shown on the attached site plan (Exhibit A)
- District would remove the existing pavilion and relocate its functions south to the approximate location shown on the site plan along with handicapped access to the pavilion(Exhibit A)
- District would maintain the children's playground as shown on the site plan and be responsible for repair or replacement of the equipment if and when such is needed with equipment of similar value and features (Exhibit A)
- District would clear, develop and maintain a soccer field intended as a practice field for high school soccer on the lower section of the parcel as shown on the site plan (Exhibit A)
- District would secure the access road gate to prevent unauthorized use of the roadway
- District would provide an easement to allow continued city access of the existing well and pump house located on the property
- District and City will define other needed easements on the property and define maintenance responsibilities of these easements

#### **Operational Requirements:**

- District will agree not to rent the soccer field for other than school purposes. All non-programmed use of the field will be reserved for the community
- District will post on its website at the first of each month all programmed use of the baseball, softball and soccer fields and tennis courts so that the neighborhood will be aware of the scheduled events
- District will permit community use of the soccer field, tennis courts and walking track during non-programmed times and will sign such facilities allowing the use (which signs shall be approved by the district's risk management staff)

#### Changes to Allowed Uses:

- Any change of uses beyond those included in the Interlocal Agreement will require:
  - A resolution detailing the changes requested approved by the Provo School District Board of Education by a majority vote at a meeting in which public comment is allowed; and,
  - A resolution approving those changes approved by the Provo Municipal Council by a majority vote at a meeting in which public comment is allowed.

Dear Edgemont Neighborhood Resident:

On February 20, 2018 the Timp Kiwanis Bounous Park property is planned to be presented to Municipal Council for approval to be placed on the City's surplus property list, allowing it to be sold to the Provo School District. We formally invite you to attend and participate in the public hearing which will occur during the Municipal Council meeting beginning at 5:30 p.m. at the City Center at 351 W. Center Street.

The City was approached by the District about potentially acquiring the park to allow the District to add a girls' softball field for Timpview High to meet their federal Title IX requirements. The sale also benefits the City generally by clearing up some issues related to the federal grant standards under which most of the property for the park was acquired.

After holding a couple of neighborhood meetings last year, we have worked with the District to address the concerns expressed in those meetings. As part of the sale of the property, the City and the District have listened to the concerns and have tried to address them in the attached term sheet that will form the basis of a cooperative agreement between the City and the District to be executed with the potential sale of the property. We have also attached a copy of a site plan which shows how the parcel would be reconfigured based on feedback from the residents during the neighborhood meetings.

We look forward to seeing you at the meeting on February 20.
