1	DISCUSSION -	Defederalization	of	the	Economic	Development	Administration
2	Revolving Loan F	<u>Pund</u>				*	

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Mrs. Lewis provided background of Orem's RLF Program which included the following:

- The City of Orem Revolving Loan Fund Program was established in 1986
- The fund was made up in cash contributions of \$400,000 (60%) from the EDA and \$265,000 (40%) from the City of Orem, totaling \$665,000.
- The purpose of the RLF is to provide low cost, short term gap financing to small Orem businesses and to create permanent long-term jobs within the city.
- August of 2020, a new Orem RLF was created. The City of Orem CARES Act RLF, funded through the Cares, Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act in the amount of \$500K, provides low-cost, short-term gap financing to small Orem businesses that have suffered economic injury caused by the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.
- January 2020, the Federal Government enacted the Reinvigorating Lending for the Future Act.
- This Act gives more control back to the fund operators and allows the funds to be used for broader economic development purposes to support business development and job growth.
- The Orem EDA RLF qualifies for the release of the federal interest in the loan program.
- 20 Mrs. Lewis concluded that the defederalization of these funds will allow the economic
- development division to use the current EDA RLF funds to cover the cost of a comprehensive
- 22 update to the 2014 EDSP and potentially hire a consultant for business recruitment. This
- beneficial change will give Orem broader economic development opportunities now and into the future.

PUBLIC HEARING / ORDINANCE Amending the Current Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Budget

Mr. Nelson stated the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 City of Orem budget has many adjustments that occur throughout the fiscal year. These adjustments include grants received from Federal, State, and other governmental or private entities or organizations and the issuance of bonds. The City issued 2021 Water, Sewer & Storm Sewer Bonds in April 2021 as authorized by the Mayor & City Council. The City needs to add these bond proceeds to the appropriate enterprise funds of the City to account for the costs associated with various water, sewer, and storm water projects occurring over the next few years.

Mayor Brunst opened the public hearing at 6:20 p.m. Hearing no further comments Mayor Brunst closed the public hearing and brought the item back to the Council for further discussion.

Mayor Brunst moved, to approve by Ordinance amending the Current Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Budget. **Mrs. Lauret seconded** the motion. Those voting aye: Richard F. Brunst, Jeff Lambson, Debby Lauret, Tom Macdonald, Terry Peterson, David Spencer and Brent Sumner. The motion **passed.**

ORDINANCE – Amending Article 22-5-3(A) and the zoning map of the City of Orem by changing the zone of approximately 4.00 acres from the NVD-Res-B zone to the R8 zone located generally at 1637 North to 1753 North along 400 West.

 Mr. Bench stated this item was continued from the April 13, 2021 meeting to allow staff the opportunity to meet with the property owners whose properties are part of the application and determine if the applicants have confusion relating to the proposed rezone. Staff talked directly with three property owners in addition to two other residents in the area and determined there is no confusion relating to the rezone. All are in favor of rezoning the property from the NVD-RES(B) zone to the R8 zone as requested. The residents of the homes along the west side of 400

West from 1657 North to 1753 North have requested that the City rezone their properties from the NVD-Res-B zone to the R8 zone. This would be a reversal of the zoning that took place approximately three years ago. Each property owner except one has provided a signed letter requesting the rezone. The one who did not provide a letter is the southernmost property included in this rezone request. It is owned by the same owner of the commercial properties to the south and west. Staff held a zoom neighborhood meeting on February 9, 2021. There were about 30 residents in attendance. The neighborhood was in favor of the proposed rezone. The Planning Commission recommends the City Council, by ordinance, amend Article 22-5-3(A) and the zoning map of the City of Orem by changing the zone of approximately 4.00 acres located along 400 West between 1637 North and 1753 North from the NVD-Res-B zone to the R8 zone. Mayor Brunst moved, to approve by Ordinance amending Article 22-5-3(A) and the zoning map of the City of Orem by changing the zone of approximately 4.00 acres from the NVD-Res-B zone to the R8 zone located generally at 1637 North to 1753 North along 400 West. Mr. Macdonald seconded the motion. Those voting aye: Richard F. Brunst, Jeff Lambson, Debby Lauret, Tom Macdonald, Terry Peterson, David Spencer and Brent Sumner. Please respond to the follow questions regarding 400 W 1600 N high-density housing: FIRE 5 SAFETY: Are just two ingress/egress right-turn-only points sufficient for fire safety protocols 6 for a development of this size and use? • Where are the fire hydrants in proximity to the 7 development, and are they sufficient for two 6-story buildings? • Where will the fire trucks & 8 9 firefighters access/manage fires in emergencies (or ambulances) because the building is extremely close to both 400 W and 1600 N? Specifically, will they have to park on these streets 10 directly to fight fires or attend to medical emergencies? That will require shutting off all traffic, 11 which is unacceptable. • How will the residents and vehicles properly exit the premises during 12 emergencies? It appears to be too tight for one firetruck, let alone many firetrucks and 13 emergency vehicles. How will the firetrucks pull into the lot if all of the surface parking is 14 already taken? TRAFFIC: • Please explain what the City is planning to do to prevent any and all 15 access points from this development onto 400 West. 400 West cannot sustain any traffic from 16 this development. • Will the City of Orem try to mitigate potential traffic accidents that occur on 17 State Street, for drivers attempting left-hand turns across 6 lanes of traffic? Will "No Left Turn" 18 19 signs be installed and enforced, and where will the signs be installed? -- Drivers turn left all the time by Swig/Costa Vida on 1600 N, even though a "No Left Turn" sign exists. How will this 20 development be any different (besides the single lanes on 1600 N and the 6 lanes plus 2 turn 21 lanes on State Street)? • Will turning left onto State Street be impeded by more island cement 22 barriers along State Street and 1600 N? • Are other businesses in close proximity ok with this? 23 (the cement barriers) Will it impede clients from easily accessing their businesses? • The 24 25 entrance at 1600 N is especially worrisome, in terms of such a small corridor being sufficient to permit retail, residential, and commercial delivery/maintenance/trash/moving vehicles through 26 simultaneously, while still permitting regular flow of traffic along 1600 North. Will it be more 27 worrisome and prone to accidents during peak business hours, or in certain weather? Will the 28 small corridor be hazardous in cold & icy conditions due to its inability to get sufficient sunlight 29 30 (from the 6-stories above)? Is there sufficient drainage/pooling for ground water? • Please explain the measures that the City has taken to prevent the plans to install a connecting road from 31 32 State Street to 400 W. (plans exist on city materials) -- Please explain how this appears on City planning materials, without the existing home owner's knowledge. -- This is extremely alarming 33 to residents. There are three roads connecting to 400 West within a small area, and turning 34 onto/across 400 West is difficult already. How can the City be secretly planning for another 35 connection to happen right here? -- Is the City really considering putting a road in that leads 36 directly from the State Liquor Store to our neighborhood? What will the City do to prevent and 37 38 manage any increased crime that results from this? All relevant traffic studies, including but not limited to, the LDS Church, regarding the increased traffic use for the Lindon Temple (builders, 39 patrons, open house visitors, etc.) should be included and shared with the public. This will 40 greatly impact traffic on 400 West, as it is the only connector road directly leading to Center 41 Street [besides State Street], where the temple entrance will be located. 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- First of all, I appreciate the City Council's concern and attention given to the residents in and 2
- around the North Village District. As our elected officials we value your time in hearing and 3
- representing us. Therefore, we urge the City Council to hold City Council meetings in a hybrid 4
- 5 manner – both in person for those able, and remotely for those who cannot. With technology and
- the size of Council Chambers, going hybrid is possible. Citizen voices are not being adequately 6
- heard in this virtual format, causing confusion and more work for the Council in the end. I also 7
- urge the City Council to direct the Staff and Planning Commission to take the time to thoroughly 8
- read through and understand the Traffic Study submitted with the OBOK Condominiums 9
- application. This Traffic Study needs some serious attention as well as understanding residents' 10
- concerns with the study and their real-life experience with the area. Spending time to fully 11
- understand the current and potential traffic issues will ensure that any development is appropriate 12
- in this area. With the Traffic Study being done during Covid and data being manipulated, real 13
- 14 consideration should be taken of its validity. In addition to being the height of Covid, it was also
- a non-school day, which is clearly not an accurate representation of peak traffic times. 15
- Furthermore, the Traffic Study is inaccurate in identifying and observing one of the two 16
- easement access points. County records contradict what the Traffic Study indicates as easement 17

Over the past two weeks I've implored you to go back to in-person meetings. My phone calls have been met with comments like 'I'm fine with the virtual meetings, I'm fine if we don't go back until July' I called every municipality in Utah County. Saratoga Springs and Eagle Mountain have plans to return within the next two weeks American fork is returning tonight and every other city in Utah County has already returned to in-person meetings. Most of them returned in March but there were a couple that have been since January & even last Fall. They have found ways to respect their citizens and make it safely work. The virtual format leaves the residence at a distinct disadvantage. There are the delays, yawning during the reading of our comments, rushed reading, missed opportunity for council members to ask us questions about our comments. I've been a resident advocate for several years and I've never seen anything like this. You can't see the city council members reactions to things because they are blocked by the presenter's screen, some of them have their cameras off so who knows if they're even engaged in the meeting. Don't get me wrong I respect our council members, but it's time to be back in person. If there are council members who have health concerns there are ways that they can join the meeting virtually.

WHEREAS, the Award has been used to assist with and encourage economic development within the City; and

WHEREAS, the City's Economic Development Division of the City of Orem (EDD) currently administers the RLF; and

WHEREAS, Congress recently enacted the Lending for the Future Act (the "RLF Act") authorizing the Economic Development Agency (EDA) to release its federal interest in awards that have operated satisfactorily for seven years beyond disbursement of the funds; and

WHEREAS, the City has submitted a written request as outlined in the EDA'a Memorandum Notification of RLF De-Federalization (the "Request") asking the EDA to release its federal interest in the Award. A copy of the Request is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference; and

WHEREAS, the release of the Award will decrease the City's administrative burden and allow the Award to be used for broader economic development purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Orem City Council has reviewed the Request and hereby finds defederalization to be in the best interest of the public's health, safety and general welfare and will promote further economic development within the City of Orem.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Orem City Council as follows:

- 1. The Orem City Council hereby supports the Request asking the EDA to release its federal interest in the Award.
- 2. The Orem City Council commits to use the Award only for activities that continue to carry out the economic development purposes of the PWEDA and in compliance with on-going restrictions required by the RLF Act.
- 3. If the EDA accepts and approves the Request, the Orem City Council authorizes the City Manager to sign the Agreement to Release the federal interest in the Award in a form substantially the same as attached hereto as Exhibit B.
 - 4. All other resolutions and policies in conflict herewith, either in whole or in

EXHIBIT B – Agreement to Release the EDA Federal Interest in a Revolving Loan Fund Award

AGREEMENT TO RELEASE THE EDA FEDERAL INTEREST IN A REVOLVING LOAN FUND AWARD

THIS AGREEMENT is between the United States Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration (EDA) and the City of Orem, a political subdivision of the State of Utah (Recipient).

WHEREAS, EDA, pursuant to its authority under the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965 (PWEDA) (42 U.S.C. § 3121 *et seq.*), awarded to Recipient (or its predecessor in interest) one or more grants to capitalize a Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) bearing EDA award number 05-39-02234 (the Award).

WHEREAS, EDA retains a federal interest in the Award and Recipient has submitted a written request that EDA release its federal interest in the Award consistent with the requirements of the Reinvigorating Lending for the Future Act (Pub. L. 116-192), attached hereto as Appendix A (the Request).

WHEREAS, EDA and Recipient agree that the current value of the RLF capital base is \$392,791.49, the federal investment rate is 59.99%, and the federal share of the RLF capital base is \$236,835.42 (the Award Funds).

WHEREAS, EDA has determined that 1) more than seven years have passed since the final EDA disbursement to Recipient of funds under the Award, 2) Recipient has complied with the terms and conditions of the Award, and 3) Recipient proposes to use the Award Funds for one or more activities that continue to carry out the economic development purposes of PWEDA.

WHEREAS, EDA agrees herein to release its federal interest in the Award and Recipient agrees herein to use Award Funds for one or more activities that continue to carry out the economic development purposes of PWEDA.

NOW THEREFORE, EDA and Recipient agree as follows:

- 1. <u>EDA's Release</u>. EDA agrees to release its federal interest in the Award. EDA's reversionary interest in the Award will cease to exist as of the effective date of this agreement.
 - a. Recipient's use of Award Funds no longer needs to comply with, among other things, the following authorities:
 - i. OMB regulations at 2 CFR part 200, including the Compliance Supplement at Appendix XI.
 - ii. EDA regulations at 13 CFR chapter III, including the RLF-specific regulations at part 307, subpart B (including the requirement at 13 CFR § 307.14 to submit Form ED-209 RLF Financial Report to EDA).

- iii. The terms and conditions attached to the Award, including the Department of Commerce's Standard Terms & Conditions, the EDA RLF Standard Terms & Conditions, and any Special or Specific Award Conditions.
- iv. The EDA-approved RLF plan or any related document governing administration of the Award.
- b. This release of the EDA federal interest in the Award does not extend to or include a release of any other entity's interest in the RLF capital base, including another federal agency's interest in the RLF capital base. More specifically, if Community Development Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) or funds from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) were used as local share under the Award, this release of the EDA federal interest does not extend to or include a release of any HUD or USDA federal interest in the RLF capital base. If Recipient seeks a release of another entity's interest in the RLF capital base, including another federal agency's interest in the RLF capital base, Recipient must negotiate such a release with the other entity and EDA will not participate in that negotiation.
- 2. <u>Recipient's Use of Award Funds</u>. Recipient agrees to use Award Funds for one or more activities that continue to carry out the economic development purposes of PWEDA.
 - a. Recipient shall not use Award Funds to construct schools, community centers, municipal buildings, or otherwise use Award Funds to carry out activities outside of the economic development purposes of PWEDA, nor shall Recipient use Award Funds to pay general costs of government.
 - b. Recipient shall not transfer Award Funds to a natural person, for-profit entity, or other entity ineligible for award under sections 3(4) and 209 of PWEDA (42 U.S.C. § 3122(4) and § 3149). For the sake of clarity, Award Funds may be used to contract with for-profit entities for goods and services for one or more activities that continue to carry out the economic development purposes of PWEDA and to operate an RLF that makes loans to for-profit organizations.
 - c. Award Funds must be used in a manner consistent with EDA's non-relocation policy. Specifically, Recipient shall not use Award Funds to induce the relocation of existing jobs within the U.S. that are located outside of a jurisdiction to within that jurisdiction in competition with other U.S. jurisdictions for those same jobs.
 - d. Award Funds must be used in accordance with section 602 of PWEDA (42 U.S.C. § 3212). Specifically, Recipient shall ensure that all laborers and mechanics employed by contractors or subcontractors on projects assisted by Award Funds shall be paid wages at rates not less than those prevailing on similar construction in the locality as determined by the Secretary of Labor as provided by section 602 of PWEDA or as it may be amended in the future.
 - e. Recipient shall use Award Funds in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local law, including applicable non-discrimination law. Recipient may not use

- Award Funds for any purpose that would be prohibited by the Establishment Clause of the U.S. Constitution if the Award Funds were expended directly by the Federal Government.
- f. Recipient is not required by the terms of this Agreement to seek EDA approval or permission to use Award Funds for one or more activities that continue to carry out the economic development purposes of PWEDA but that differ from the activities described in the Request, attached hereto as Appendix A.
- g. Recipient shall provide timely and accurate responses to EDA inquiries regarding Recipient's use of the Award Funds. Following the release of EDA's federal interest, EDA remains interested in working with Recipient to promote Recipient's RLF or other activities that continue to carry out the economic development purposes of PWEDA.
- 3. <u>Enforcement</u>. In the event that EDA determines that Award Funds have been used in a manner inconsistent with this agreement, EDA may require Recipient to return the misspent portion of the Award Funds to the Federal Government, which may include the establishment of a debt with the U.S. Department of the Treasury.
- 4. <u>Indemnification</u>. To the extent permitted by law, Recipient agrees to indemnify and hold the Federal Government harmless from and against all liabilities that the Federal Government may incur as a result of releasing EDA's federal interest in the Award.
- 5. Governing Law; Severability. This Agreement is governed by applicable federal law, if any, and if there is no applicable federal law by state law. The terms of this Agreement do not limit the rights EDA, its designees, successors, or assigns are entitled to under applicable federal or state law. In the event that any provision or clause of this Agreement conflicts with applicable law, such conflict shall not affect other provisions of this Agreement that can be given effect without the conflicting provision, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are declared to be severable.
- 6. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement contains the entire understanding of EDA and Recipient with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior agreements and understandings, oral or written, with respect to such matters.
- 7. <u>Authority</u>. Recipient represents that (a) it has the power and authority to execute and perform this Agreement, (b) the execution and performance of this Agreement by Recipient have been duly authorized by all necessary corporate or other actions, (c) Recipient has duly and validly executed this Agreement, and (d) this Agreement is a legal, valid and binding obligation, enforceable against Recipient.

WHEREAS, upon the recommendation of the City Council, pay-as-you-go funding plans were adopted to support the implementation of the utility master plans; and

WHEREAS, in 2020, the Orem City Council desired to adopt a hybrid funding philosophy that would take advantage of exceptionally low bond interest rates, accelerate the construction of targeted multi-generational capital improvement projects, and minimize the negative outcomes of compounding construction inflation rates; and

WHEREAS, in 2020, the City hired Bowen Collins and Associates, Inc. (BCA) to review, evaluate, and update these utility master plans; and

WHEREAS, in 2020, the City engaged its Financial Consultant, Lewis Young Robertson & Burningham, Inc. (LYRB), to update the corresponding utility financial plans and prepare the City to sell revenue bonds to support the construction of the targeted capital improvement projects; and

WHEREAS, the primary objectives of updating the financial plans were to ensure sufficient revenues to cover all operation and maintenance expenses while maintaining bond covenants, ensuring the appropriate debt service coverage ratio, and providing sufficient revenue to fund the proposed projects identified in the utility master plans.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OREM, as follows:

- 1. The Orem City Council hereby adopts the 2021 Water Master Plan, 2021 Sewer Master Plan, and the 2021 Storm Water Master Plan, copies of which are attached hereto as Exhibits "A", "B", and "C", respectively, and incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. All other resolutions and policies in conflict herewith, either in whole or in part, are hereby repealed.
- 3. This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon passage.

Background:

The Orem CDBG Advisory Commission reviewed and heard funding proposals from community organizations and others who wish to receive CDBG funding for Fiscal Year 2021-2022. The public hearing will be the second of two opportunities for the public comment on the recommendations before the City Council officially adopts the Final Statement of Projected Uses of Funds for Orem's 2019-2020 Community Development Block Grant. The first public hearing was held on April 13, 2021. Following today's public hearing, the City Council will adopt a resolution approving the CDBG Final Statement of Projected Uses of Funds for 2021-2022. The Emergency Extension specifically authorizes the Agency to extend the tax increment collection period in a project area, by up to two years as an impacted project area if (1) the Agency determines the conditions resulting from the COVID-19 emergency will likely delay the Agency's implementation of the Project Area Plan; (2) or cause the Agency to receive an amount of tax increment from the project area that is less than the amount of tax increment the Agency expected the Agency would receive from the project area. The Developer has represented to the Agency that its construction costs have increased during the pandemic, construction has slowed or stalled thereby delaying the implementation of the Project Area Plan for the University Place Project Area. The Developer has also represented that the demand for mixed-use has flagged and that an extension of an additional

two years will allow these markets to rebound and the Agency to recapture any tax increment lost to the loss in demand. The University Place Project Area has a tax increment collection period of 20 years. Staff and Woodbury jointly recommend that the Agency extend the tax increment collection period from 20 to 22 years. Staff also recommends that the RDA amend the Participation Agreement between the Agency and Developer to reflect this extension.

General discussion ensued regarding some of the improvements that have been made at the University Place Project Area and what has been planned in the future.






