

Based upon the result of the discussion, **Mayor Woolstenhulme** addressed Ms. Frohm stating that while they understood her plight, they would not be granting her request for an exemption from the water restrictions due to the uncertainty with the water supply and setting precedent.

Mayor Woolstenhulme asked for any other public comment for items not listed on the agenda. None.

3. Public Hearing for the Oakley City Land Management & Development Code – Possible Action that includes potential adoption of the General Plan revision and all related maps including zoning and sensitive overlay.

Planning Commissioners Zane Woolstenhulme and Doug Evans along with City Planner Stephanie Woolstenhulme presented the Council with the final draft of the Land Use and Development Code update. They reviewed specific areas of the new code language along with maps and informed Council of the Public Hearings that had previously been held.

Councilmember Smart stated that he has been working with the planning commission and would like to commend them for their work. He went on to ask questions regarding affordable housing and subdivisions as it applies to the city in terms of developers and the determination of what deems housing affordable.

Councilmember Neff asked about impact fees and whether we have them in place in the current code.

Recorder Rydalch stated that yes impact fees are in place but suggested that there needs to be an impact fee study done and that the city needs to update their impact fees. She further explained that this study can help measure the impact on city utility systems but also measures the impact on our roads, school districts, etc.

Mayor Woolstenhulme opened the Public Hearing for comment. **No Public Comment was received.**

Mayor Woolstenhulme closed the Public Hearing.

Councilmember Wilmoth made a motion to approve the adoption of the General Plan revision and related maps as presented. **Councilmember Smart** seconded the motion. All voted in favor. **General Plan revision adoption approved.**

Councilmember Frazier made a motion to formally adopt the official zoning map and sensitive lands overlay map dated this date May 12th, 2021. **Councilmember Neff** seconded the motion. All voted in favor. **Zoning map and sensitive lands overlay map adoption approved.**

Councilmember Wilmoth made a motion to formally adopt the 2021-05 Oakley City Land Management & Development Code. **Councilmember Neff** seconded the motion.

Mayor Woolstenhulme wanted it noted how grateful the council is for the planning commission's efforts to take on this project. It is a significant contribution to the City.

4. Utah Beverage Company Proposal

Recorder Rydalch stated Harold Jahn approached members of the city office to review terms of the contract that is currently in place with the Oakley Artesian bottling company. Mr. Jahn and his business associates are interested in approaching the city with a joint business venture using city water, similar to Oakley Artesian but for a slightly different product.

Harold Jahn proposed that he and his business partner, Dexter Baker, obtain a license with the city to bottle and distribute city water as well as fruit juices. He stated that they have been attempting to work with Oakley Artesian in this business venture but have not had much success and therefore have brought the proposal to the city instead. Mr. Jahn and his business partner believe that Oakley water could be distributed across the United States. He went on to state that the Oakley water is currently limited in its availability and distribution to other regions. Mr. Jahn addressed the drought issue that currently faces the city by stating that they would get around that by producing product in the offseason when the city does not need the water i.e.: September – March building enough inventory to not be a burden on the community's need for water during the warmer months. He proposed a three precent royalty for the city on their products to focus on the community and making sure that the city is well-represented in their business dealings.

Mayor Woolstenhulme asked for specifications on the building development that would have to take place for the venture. Mr. Jahn stated that they would need the 30 acres to build the bottling plant, green-housing and room for expansion. The plan is to grow elements of the juicing component onsite. His hope is by doing so they would be less reliant on imports from other regions of the world.

Councilmember Wilmoth wanted it noted, that while he recognizes the terms of the agreement Mr. Jahn was able to review with Oakley Artesian, that the city does have the right to shut off

their water when the community needs it the most. He also noted that the council denied a community member from watering grass seed earlier in the meeting and his inclination is a denial of this proposal. **Mr. Jahn** reiterates that they would only be taking city water during the winter months and build up storage so that they would not be a burden on the community water needs. He noted his qualifications in his previous business ventures that deal with the same issues.

Councilmember Smart was concerned about the current emergency of building a new well as soon as possible to support community needs and asked Mr. Jahn what their plan is regarding a new well to support their business venture. Mr. Jahn responded that the timeline of the business plan would be that they wouldn't start using city water until the following spring and that they have included in the proposal the possibility of drilling their own well in the event that the city wants to allocate 100 percent of the city wells to the community needs, the business could put one in themselves at their own expense.

Mayor Woolstenhulme asked Mr. Jahn if they would be interested in partnering with the city in constructing a new well. Mr. Jahn responded that they would be interested in that opportunity. He asked further what the timeline is on the agenda. Mr. Jahn responded that they are willing to meet with the city and come up with an agenda together in person. He also states that the bottling plant would create jobs in the community as well.

Councilmembers thanked Mr. Jahn for his time and stated they will get back to him in the future.

5. Possible Adoption of Temporary Land Use Regulation

Councilmembers discussed the impacts of new landscaping and residential developments on the current taxation of the City's water supply. **Councilmembers** stated their concern regarding the new homes being developed before there is a more water sourcing from a new well.

Councilmember Smart suggested that the city put a moratorium on new outside landscaping and new home construction without foregoing any current landscaping or development that is already in progress.

City Attorney confirmed that the city can limit the number of building permits given to the public given the event of a moratorium based on the current infrastructure in place as long as it is in the greater public interest.

Mayor Woolstenhulme suggested that the city put a moratorium on outdoor landscaping and outdoor watering while allowing new home construction to continue. After further discussion with input from Water Operator Hansen the Mayor changed his recommendation to include a

moratorium on all new building and outdoor landscaping other than all building permits that have been issued or applied for.

Councilmember Frazier made a motion to place an immediate moratorium on all building that requires a water hook up and a moratorium on all new outside landscaping related to new construction, due to the current drought conditions, city water supply concerns, and impending water projects for a period of six months or until the city determines that the city water supply concerns have been resolved.

Councilmember Smart seconded the motion.

General discussion with input from Commissioners Evans, Woolstenhulme, and Water Operator Dallas Hansen regarding impact fees and the best way to address the issue of fee studies, drafting a capital facilities plan, etc.

Councilmember Frazier reminded the Council that they needed to be considering whether to participate in the community renewable energy program as a deadline for possible participation is looming. A decision needs to be made at the next Council meeting.

Recorder Rydalch relayed information from Public Works Director, Kendell Staples regarding information on speed bump pricing for North Bench.

b. Mayor Woolstenhulme and Councilmembers reported on their areas of responsibility for the 4th Celebration. Bailee & Jena Woolstenhulme will be bosting the borse show.
