




UTA Board Dashboard March 2022












Sales Tax Collections (Percentage Growth for 12 months ended February 28, 2022)




- % growth in base sales tax revenues over prior year


Background

- In June 2021, UTA entered into an agreement with Salt Lake County and the University of Utah to install air monitors on three UTA electric buses, and to gather, process, and visualize the real-time air quality monitoring data.
 - UTA and Salt Lake County each contributed \$20,000 toward the project. The University is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the monitors.
 - Equipment has been installed on 3 buses and is fully functional.



Amendment Details

- This Amendment No. 1 makes the following changes to the Air Quality Monitoring ILA:
 - Renews ILA for a period of one year from April 22, 2022, through April 21, 2023
 - Adds Salt Lake City Corporation as a party to the agreement
 - Provides that Salt Lake City will host a website housing and making available to the public air quality data analysis derived from the project



Amendment Details

- Adds a new section defining the duties of Salt Lake City including the following:
 - Financial contribution to the project: \$42,500, to be used for:
 - Personnel costs related to data analysis
 - Purchase of hardware and server needed to house project data
 - Parts and hardware for air quality monitors, as needed
 - Website development
 - City will develop a map depicting Salt Lake County for the real-time display of air quality data, including data from e-Buses, TRAX, and stationary monitors
 - The map will be displayed on a public-facing website
 - City will host the public-facing website, at a neutral domain address, for the duration of the project


PARKING DETAILS

- Use UTA for non-stop service from Clearfield Station to the Air Show!




PROHIBITED ITEMS

Summary of Budget Adjustment

- UTA is procuring a new fare revenue collection system to replace the current system
- The implementation of this new system will be a multi-phased effort that will span multiple years
- This request would provide an FTE for a project manager responsible for successful acquisition, installation, and implementation of the new system
- Funding for this position will come from the approved budget in the capital project
- The 2022-2025 5-Year Capital plan includes \$47 million to plan, procure, and install the system
- There is no impact to the existing budget or adopted fund balances

Ticket Vending Machines

- Ensure security compliance
- Vend smart cards not paper tickets
- Reload value to smart cards

Mobile App

- Virtual smartcard (not ticket based)
- Manage, reload fare value to card

Electronic Fare Collection System




Summary of Budget Request

Request seeks to:

- Seek approval to proceed to the Local Advisory Council for consultation on this capital budget request to:
 - Add three projects to the capital budget
 - Restore Capital Contingency to \$5 million
- Provide update on current status of State-funded fixed-guideway projects




- Request project to be added to 2022 Capital Budget
 - **\$288,000**
- Funding sources include CMAQ funding and UTA funds:
 - CMAQ portion is \$268,500
 - UTA portion is \$19,500
 - UTA share from fund balance





MSPXX1- Station Area Planning


- Project will allow UTA to begin in earnest with it's Station Area Planning (SAP) responsibilities
- SAP's required by HB462
- Funding amount covers costs to initiate effort in 2022
- Funded from fund balance





SGRXX1- Fiber Rehab and Replacement


- Fiber Rehab and Replacement Project would be to start replacing some of its original Fiber Optical cabling originally installed with the original North/South Trax line.
- Fiber is approximately 23 years old and is approaching the end of its useful life.
- Project is for materials and design efforts. Installation and construction would occur in 2023.
- 2023 budget to be addressed in the 2023 Capital Budget request process this summer.
- Funded from fund balance.






Request is to restore the Capital Contingency budget to its original \$5 million amount

State Funded Project Update – House Bill 322

- UTA and UDOT are currently in the process of creating a Management Plan in response to the House Bill Legislation earlier this year
- Currently working through details of management structure including:
 - Project Management
 - Contract Management
 - Budget Process
 - Federal Funding Details
- Impacts will be shared with LAC as details are finalized
- HB 322 includes language requiring UTA to pay UDOT \$5 million per year for 15 years to "facilitate the purchase of zero emissions or low emissions rail engines and trainsets"

Trespassing Ordinance Update



UTA Public Ordinance Update

- UTA Ordinances
- Pursuant to Utah Code Ann. § 17B-1-301 and 17B-2a-808; a board of trustees of a large public transit district may:
 - Make and pass ordinances, resolutions, and orders that are:
 - Not repugnant to the United States Constitution, the Utah Constitution, or the provisions of this part;
 and
 - Necessary for:
 - (A) the governance and management of the affairs of the district;
 - (B) the execution of district powers; and
 - (C) carrying into effect the provisions of this part.



UTA Trespassing Ordinance

- Cross functional team Legal, Planning & Engagement, Police, Operations, Real Estate/Properties,
 Safety, Records, and Customer Service
- Goals
 - Increase compliance, clarify and make consistent
 - Update to align with new technologies and current practices
 - Review internal processes and procedures



Trespassing Ordinance Overview

The draft ordinance includes 9 sections:

- 1. Definitions
- 2. Authority
- 3. Trespass for Minor Offense
- 4. Trespass for Serious Offense
- 5. Permanent Trespass
- 6. Other Remedies
- 7. Records
- 8. Protests
- 9. Right to Appeal



Section 3 – Trespass for Minor Offense

- "Minor Offense" means:
 - a violation of the ordinances of the Authority;
 - a violation of the Authority's ridership rules;
 - an infraction; or
 - a Class C misdemeanor.
 - Grounds
 - Minor offenses may constitute a removal of access to UTA property & services by a Transit Police
 Officer
 - Duration
 - 30 days maximum
 - Notice
 - Written Trespass Order will be issued to include: offense/reason; locations where trespass applies; date & duration; right to protest & appeal



Section 4 – Trespass for Serious Offense

- "Serious Offense" means:
 - an offense classified under state law as a Class B misdemeanor or greater offense; or
 - the commission of three minor offenses by an individual within a twelve-month consecutive period.
 - Grounds
 - Serious offenses may constitute a removal of access to UTA property & services by a Transit Police
 Officer
 - Duration
 - 1 year maximum
 - Notice
 - Written Trespass Order will be issued to include: offense/reason; locations where trespass applies; date & duration; right to protest & appeal



Section 5 – Permanent Trespass

- Grounds
 - An individual who causes serious bodily injury or death to an employee of the Authority may be trespassed from Authority property and/or Authority services by a Transit Police Officer.
- Duration
 - No expiration
- Notice
 - Written Trespass Order will be issued to include: offense/reason; locations where trespass applies; date & duration; right to protest & appeal
- Reinstatement of Privileges
 - May petition no sooner than 5 years



Section 6 – Other Remedies

- Criminal Trespass
 - Provides Transit Police Officers ability to issue a criminal citation to an individual who violates Utah Code §76-6-206, as amended.
- Refusal of Service
 - Provides an Authorized Representative ability to eject a passenger or refuse service to an individual who violates the rules and/or ordinances of the Authority for a period of up to 24 hours.



Section 7 - Records

- Requires documentation of Trespass Order by Transit Police Officer
- Provides sharing of documentation (redacted) with relevant UTA departments to ensure compliance
- Trespass Orders are classified as private records pursuant to GRAMA statute §63G-2-302(2)(d)



Section 8 - Protests

- Provides ability to protest trespass order, writing to Hearing Officer within 14 days
- Hearing is scheduled, held, and decision rendered
- Right to appeal within 10 days of decision

Section 9 - Right to Appeal

- Right to appeal within 10 days of decision
- Appeals Officer holds de novo appeals hearing
- Decision is final administrative action and must be rendered in writing within 30 days
