The most important wireless network in the country

FirstNet is a nationwide, high-speed wireless broadband network and set of specialized, innovative tools, technologies and features specifically built for public safety.

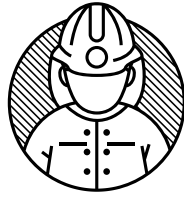
FirstNet is designed for every first responder in the country – career or volunteer; city, state, tribal or federal; and urban, suburban or rural. Think firefighters, EMS personnel, law enforcement, 9-1-1 communicators and emergency managers. FirstNet is also available to a community of users who are critical to supporting an emergency response – including nurses and physicians or utility companies that clear downed power lines and manage gas leaks.

Why was it created?

Public safety is called upon to handle emergencies every single day. They must be ready for the worst with the best tools to help them respond as quickly and safely as possible. But first responders have repeatedly struggled to reliably communicate and coordinate across agencies and jurisdictions.

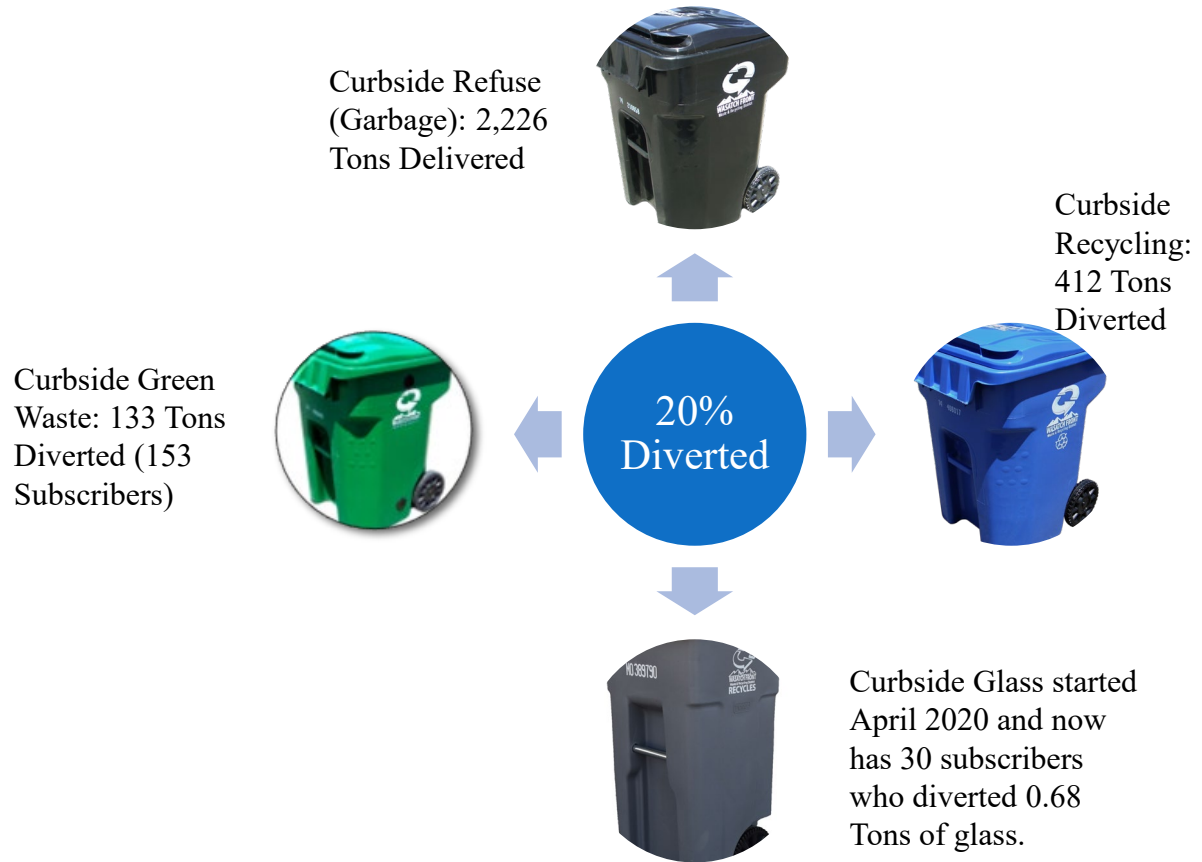

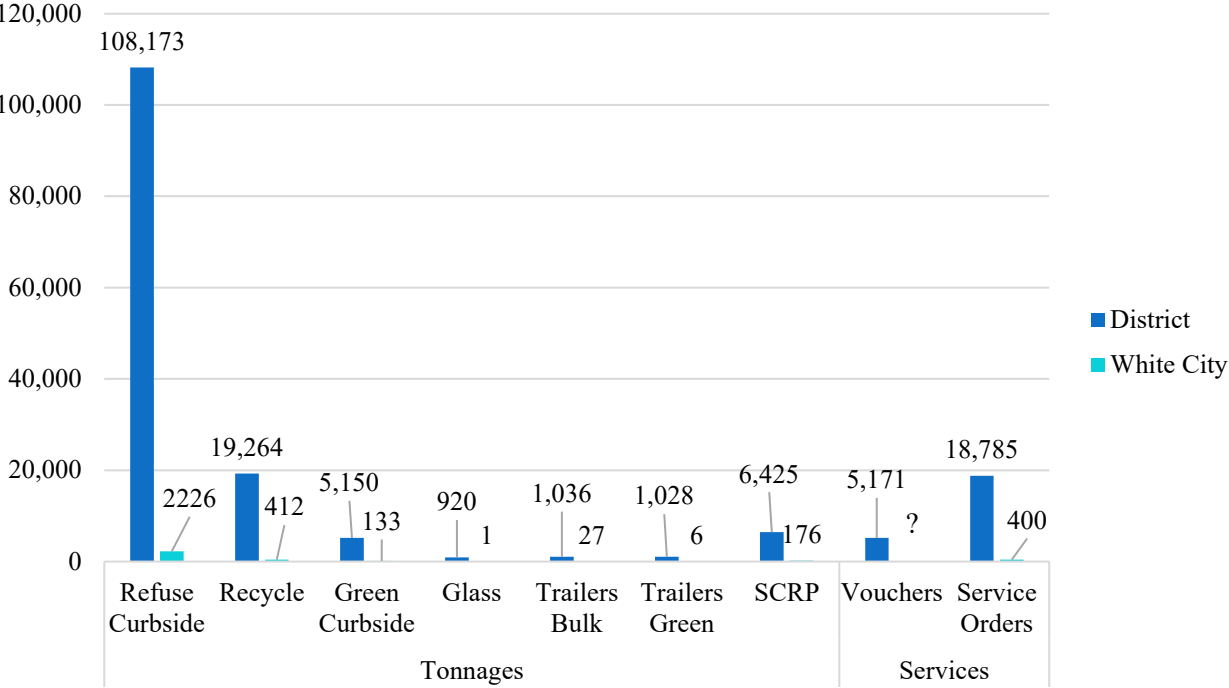
2022 White City Curbside Tonnages and Diversion



- ✓ Residents of White City diverted approximately 19.68% of waste from the landfill in 2022, compared to a District-wide estimated 17.79% diversion.
- ✓ Sustainability coordinator outreach and one of our drivers attended Southeast Township Days at Big Bear Park with 1,500 attendees.
- ✓ Avg disposal fee for garbage = \$34.15 per ton.
- ✓ Avg processing fee for recycling = \$35.05 per ton.
- ✓ Avg processing for green = \$18.00 per ton.

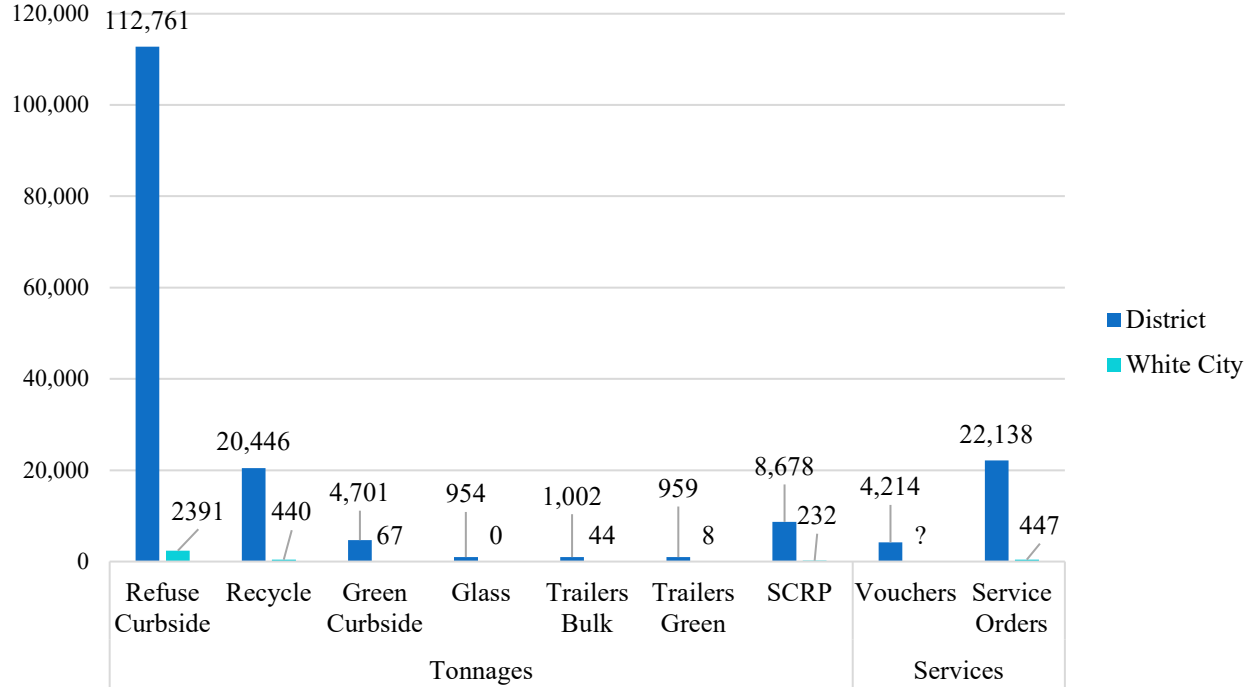
2022 Tonnage and Service Comparisons for White City and District-wide, noting the decrease in Curbside Tonnages for Recycling and Garbage. WFWRD services 1,826 homes in White City, which is 2% of the 85,936 homes in the District.

✓ 5,171 Landfill Vouchers redeemed by WFWRD customers at the Trans-Jordan & Salt Lake County Sites totaling \$75,846 in customer savings. Trans Jordan does not report vouchers redeemed for So East Islands.

Tonnages and Services: 2021



✓ 4,214 Landfill Vouchers redeemed by WFWRD customers at the Trans-Jordan & Salt Lake County Sites totaling \$61,683 in customer savings. Trans Jordan does not report vouchers redeemed for So East Islands.

Seasonal Container Reservation Program (SCRCP)



District-Wide Services:

9,604 SCRCP reservations and containers delivered over the 120-day program (11% of the 85,428 homes in the District). This service level equated to an average of 71 deliveries each day with an average of 2.50 tons per container.

White City:

240 containers delivered during the 3 days in the City, which is 13% of the 1,826 total number of homes serviced in the City and 2.4% of the total number of containers delivered district wide.

We accommodated 85% of the 283 requested reservations.

Reminders

- The Weekly Subscription Green Waste Collection Program will resume beginning Wednesday, March 15th, for White City residents.
- White City currently has 153 out of the 10,464 district-wide subscribers (1.46%).
- Residents can sign up and help divert green waste from the landfill to be processed into mulch that can be purchased for use from the Salt Lake Valley and Trans-Jordan Landfills.
- Cost:
 - ✓ A one-time start-up fee of \$70 to pay for the can
 - ✓ \$126 per year – NOTE: A green waste can is less expensive per year than an additional black garbage can at \$234 per year (\$10.50 a month vs. \$19.50 a month)

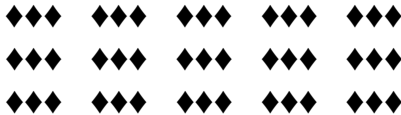

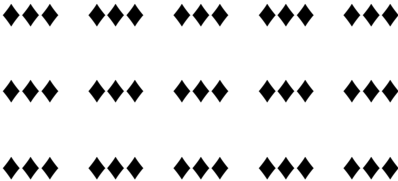

2022 Greater Salt Lake Municipal Services District (MSD) Accomplishments

Brian Hartsell, Assistant General Manager, Greater Salt Lake Municipal Services District, reviewed the MSD’s 2022 accomplishments in the areas of finance, human resources, completed capital projects, emergency management, information technology, communications, administration, and planning and development services.

The workshop was closed.

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Business Meeting

Introduction of Lannie Chapman

Lannie Chapman, Salt Lake County Clerk, introduced herself stating that she is the Clerk/Recorder for the metro townships. Going forward she would like to attend White City’s meetings bi-annually to get feedback from the Council.

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White City Financial Report

Dave Sanderson, Financial Manager, stated 71 percent of White City Metro Township’s allocated budget was used. That is 29 percent below budget. A few line items went slightly over budget. The Greater Salt Lake Municipal Services District (MSD) did well as a whole. Any amount that was not spent will be rolled over to the capital projects fund.

Council Member Price, seconded by Council Member Perry, moved to accept White City Metro Township’s financial report. The motion passed unanimously.

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Unified Fire Authority

Captain Ken Aldridge updated the Council on various construction projects. The budget process has begun. The Chief will make a presentation to the finance committee in April, with the final budget be adopted in June. Recruit camp begins in February. There were a few promotions, and one retirement.

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Unified Police Department

Detective Josh Smith reviewed calls for service for the month of January stating there has been an increase in domestic violence and suspicious activity calls. He is getting emails about incidents that are happening around White City, but police are not being called at the time of the incident. It is important that incidents are reported so officers can document the individuals involved.

Chief Randy Thomas stated Hillcrest High School had an incident with a trespassing juvenile that was carrying a gun. Situations like these are dangerous for officers inside the schools because they do not have a radio signal to call for help. Because of incidents like these, he is going to the capital to discuss legislation to require school districts to install repeaters during construction of new schools. He is also working on getting repeaters inside current schools.



Public Comments

Tyler Huish thanked the Council for giving him the opportunity to serve on the Community and Economic Development Advisory Council (CEDAC). New pool safety requirements set by the State of Utah are going into effect on February 1, 2023. White City's community pool may not meet the new requirements. The Council has discussed a change in how candidates are voted for. The proposed changes will create more confusion and electors will need further education. It may over politicize what has been a good election process.



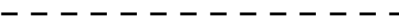

Per-Seat, Single Member At-Large Elections

Paul Ashton reviewed an ordinance requiring per-seat, single member at-large elections for the White City Metro Township Council. Rather than having candidates listed on the ballot and citizens voting for the top two or three candidates, they will run against a specific person. If the Council would like to consider this type of election, it will need to hold a public hearing to get citizen input.

Mayor Flint suggested leaving the election as it is for this year.

Council Member Perry stated if the Council wants to consider changing the type of election, it may want to conduct a survey to get feedback on what the residents want.

Council Member Price stated she has asked several residents if they are confused about how to vote the current ballot and they said no. She presented the new format to these individuals and there was not a lot of positive feedback.

Council Member Perry stated a postcard should be sent to residents educating them on the process.

Rori Andreason stated if the Council wants to change the election, it may want to do it on a year when the mayor is being elected.

Council Member Cardenaz stated residents need to be educated.

Ms. Andreason stated she can get information out to the residents about the election.

2023 Legislative Session and Proposed Bills

Paul Ashton stated the Unified Police Department (UPD) bill has been filed and has been made public. There are concerns with the current language in the bill that needs to be amended to define certain aspects of the bill.

Utah League of Cities and Towns (ULCT) are watching various changes in the law. ULCT has a legislative policy committee that meets on Mondays. He sits as a representative for White City for that committee. Two additional Council Members can join the committee. The Legislature is in its third week and Council Members can listen virtually.

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Council Reports

Greater Salt Lake Municipal Services District (MSD)

Mayor Flint stated Brian Hartsell, Assistant General Manager, MSD, has done a wonderful job putting together the MSD report and presenting it.

Community and Economic Development Advisory Council (CEDAC)

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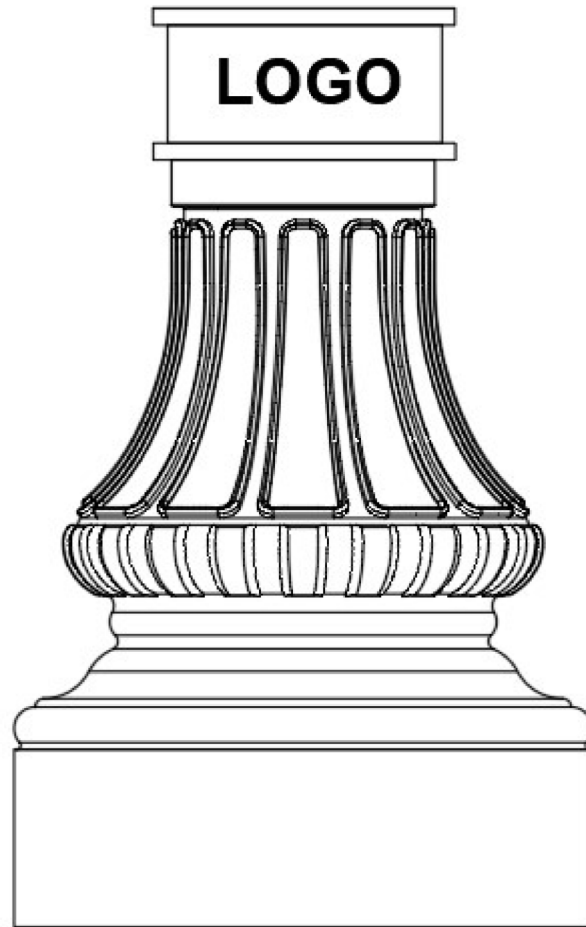

Below is the good faith estimate for the upcoming **2023 Municipal Election** for **White City Metro Township**. Assumptions for providing this estimate consist of the following:

- A. Active voters (as of 1/27/2023): **2,975**
- B. Election for the offices below:

2023 Offices
Council At-Large 1
Council At-Large 2
Council At-Large 3

All billing will be based on actual costs.

If your municipality pursues traditional voting, **not** ranked choice voting (RCV), **and** has a Primary Election and a General Election, the estimated cost would be \$7,739.

If your municipality chooses RCV for the General Election **and** cancels the Primary Election, the estimated cost would be \$5,030 for the General Election **plus** RCV costs (see below).

If your municipality chooses RCV for the Primary Election **and** holds a traditional voting General Election, the estimated cost would be \$7,739 plus the RCV costs (see below).

RCV Costs will be applied on a sliding scale, see below. If your municipality chooses to hold a RCV election for either the Primary or the General, the added costs will be dependent upon how many other municipalities opt into RCV.

As an example, if White City Metro Township is the only municipality to hold a RCV election, the costs would be as quoted above plus \$36,156. You can see if two municipalities choose RCV, your added costs would be \$18,078. (See the chart below for the additional cost depending on how many municipalities participate.)

2023 Municipal Elections
Scope of Work

The City agrees to the consolidation of all election administrative functions to ensure the successful conduct of multiple, simultaneous municipal, local district elections and county elections and the County agrees to conduct vote by mail/consolidated polls elections for the City.

In a consolidated election, decisions made by the County regarding resources, procedures and policies are based upon providing the same scope and level of service to all the participating jurisdictions and the City recognizes that such decisions, made for the benefit of the whole, may not be subject to review by the City.

Services the County will perform for the City include, but are not limited to:

- Ballot layout and design
- Ballot ordering and printing
- Machine programming and testing
- Delivery of supplies and equipment
- Provision of all supplies
- Election vote centers/early vote locations
- Vote by Mail administration
- Updating state and county websites
- Tabulating, reporting, auditing and preparing canvassing election results
- Conducting recounts as needed
- All notices and mailings required by law (except those required by Utah Code Ann. Ch. 11-14, Part 2 and § 20A-9-203)
- Direct payment of all costs associated with the elections to include vote center workers, training, vote centers, rovers.

The City will provide all voter education outreach related to Rank Choice Voting, if applicable.

The City will provide the County Clerk with information, decisions, and resolutions and will take appropriate actions required for the conduct of the elections in a timely manner.

The County will provide a good faith estimate for budgeting purposes (Exhibit "B"). Election costs are variable and are based upon the offices scheduled for election, the number of voters, the number of jurisdictions participating as well as any direct costs incurred.

The City will be invoiced for its pro-rata share of the actual costs of the elections which are estimated in Exhibit B. In the event of a state or county special election being held in conjunction with a municipal election, the scope of services and associated costs, and the method of calculating those costs, will remain unchanged.
